Dear Friends

But Peter and the apostles answered: "We must obey God rather than any human authority" (Acts 5:29).

As I reflected on this verse from our Acts reading for this Sunday, I couldn't help wondering, if the Apostles' bold declaration in the face of religious and political pressure, held increasing prophetic resonance for our own times?

Figures like Alexi Navalny and the unnamed protesters in Myanmar Turkey and Iran, are of course stark contemporary reminders of the risks of speaking truth to power when it contradicts state narratives. But what of democracies where the tension is less about naked persecution, more about cultural or institutional pressure? As the geo-political world order seemingly dissolves before our eyes, how should our Christian faith inform our view of seemingly democratic societies, those in the new world order who's burgeoning self-believe spawns a demand for moral compromise?

In such societies, in an era of wider sources of misinformation and state propaganda, is the creeping challenge more about how far as Christians we compromise core convictions in the name of political ideological conformity?

If it is so, as I increasingly suspect, then Acts 5:29 does well to remind us of a deeper allegiance—to truth, to justice, and especially to God's will. So, as the global drama continues to unfold around us, passages like Acts 5 and 1Timothy 6: 4-10 serve as a timely reminder for our prayers that allegiance to divine principles - such as justice, compassion, integrity - must eventually take precedence, even when that choice is inconvenient or unpopular.
