THOUGHTS FROM THE VICARAGE



One of my favourite poems was written in 1978 by the African-American writer, Maya Angelou. It's entitled 'Still I Rise', and presents a powerful message of resilience in the face of adversity. It begins:

You may write me down in history With your bitter, twisted lies, You may trod me in the very dirt But still, like dust, I'll rise.

She continues, reflecting the experiences of African-Americans during the Civil Rights struggle,

Out of the huts of history's shame
I rise
Up from a past that's rooted in pain
I rise
I'm a black ocean, leaping and wide,
Welling and swelling I bear in the tide.
Leaving behind nights of terror and fear
I rise
Into a daybreak that's wondrously clear
I rise
Bring the gifts that my ancestors gave,
I am the dream and the hope of the slave.
I rise
I rise
I rise
I rise.

Maya Angelou was deeply influenced by the Christian faith – the poetry and prose of Southern black preachers, and the lyricism and directness of black Gospel music. Her poem 'Still I Rise' is essentially an Easter poem, springing from the unstoppability of Jesus' own resurrection. I pray that this Easter we'll know that same certainty of hope that Maya Angelou found and expressed so powerfully.

MISSION FOCUS: RESKILLED

Located at St Peters Shared Church (Hall Extension), 37 Hazel Avenue, Guildford GU1 1NP





You may remember that William Lowries came to speak at All Saints in October about ReSkilled. In case you missed it, here is some more information about one of our Mission partners.



ReSkilled is a Christian charity based in Guildford which aims to reduce social isolation and give people back self-esteem, choices and hope, by enabling them to rediscover the fulfilment and benefits of being in employment.

It was founded by Piers in January 2019 using his experiences of

teaching in prisons, self-employment and working in wood, and having come to the realisation that God had given him a passion to help people who were excluded from work.

ReSkilled wood workshop is a 'pre-employment' opportunity in which participants can learn a range of generic work skills and practical woodwork skills to increase their confidence and prepare them to manage in a workplace.



These skills are taught by staff and volunteers in an encouraging and supportive environment – whilst retaining the expectations of quality of work required in any mainstream workplace.

How do people join?

ReSkilled generally expects people to be referred. Current referrers include Guildford Borough Council Wellbeing Team and Voluntary Action South West Surrey amongst others.

Once referred, they will be sent an application form to be filled in and returned.

They are then invited to see the workshop and meet one of the staff for a chat and to go through what participants do at ReSkilled. This gives both them and the staff an opportunity to see if this could be a helpful opportunity.

Participants attend for one day a week on a seven-week taster course before being able to continue for a further 18 weeks. The staff demonstrate and teach generic work skills, along with hand and machine wood skills, all of which will be recorded in individuals' portfolios to evidence progress and be of clear use to a future employer.

After 25 weeks, participants are referred to the Voluntary Action centre in Guildford or Volunteer Woking who will facilitate a voluntary role, in which skills can be further developed and confidence maintained.


From this point, it is expected that individuals will either sustain voluntary work or move into paid employment.

ReSkilled makes a range of handmade wooden gifts and accessories.

The products below are part of an expanding variety, available to buy online through Etsy.com – listed as ReSkilledWood. They also take commissions.

The purpose of making and selling the products that participants create is not only to raise individuals' confidence through seeing what they can achieve, nor is it simply a way of generating income for ReSkilled; but it is particularly for participants to experience the satisfaction of knowing that someone is willing to pay for something that they have made.



It is hoped that ReSkilled will be able to have a stall and raise their profile at our Autumn Fair in September.

PARISH PROFILE: IVY & RICHARD HAYLER

Ivy and Richard live on Manor Way with their two boys, Hugo (ten) and Eric (seven). They moved into the parish about a year ago, having previously rented in the Epson Road area. Before that, they spent 11 years living in Singapore. Ivy first met Richard at Bristol University, where they were both studying biochemistry.

Tell us what brought you to All Saints

It was Eric, our younger son! We had never been a very religious family, but when we first returned to the UK in late 2023, Eric had attended a Church of England school (Chilworth), which had introduced him to Christianity. Since then, his curiosity about the religion has grown. Last summer, he told us he would like to attend a church service, and since we had just moved to Onslow Village, we decided to try out the Sunday service at All Saints. We attended our very first Sunday service in June 2024 and have been coming ever since. It was a very special moment for us when we (the boys and Ivy) were baptised at All Saints just before Christmas last year.

What do you value most about All Saints and its community?

Ivy: I greatly value the devotion and sense of service shown by the many members of the All Saints' community. Through my involvement with the various groups of All Saints (Toddler Group, Finance Vision Group, Women's Bible Study Group), I have been touched by how tirelessly each member dedicates their time and effort in serving the community. Despite the relatively small congregation, it has a diverse range of groups catering for many segments of the community. Special 'shout-outs' to: Carolyn for warmly welcoming our family to All Saints and for inducting me into the Toddler Group; Jeanette for being the pillar of the Toddler Group especially with Carolyn's imminent departure; Trish and Eve for being so generous with their time during the preparation of the financial statements; and Beverly for her support in our spiritual growth!

Where do you like to spend time in Guildford?

WRITING ABOUT FANTASTICALLY FAITHFUL HEROES... AND WORLD CHANGERS BY PAUL KERENSA

When a publisher approached me to write two children's books (Fantastically Faithful Heroes Who Gave Their All for God and Fantastically Faithful World Changers Who Gave Their All for God) about inspirational Christians from modern history, my first question was: who?

Well, I had a dream that Martin Luther King Jr would be one of them. As one of the twentieth century's most famous and fearless activists, his life story was familiar to me, especially his role in the Civil Rights Movement and the March on Washington, culminating in his legendary 'I have a dream' speech. I remembered reading that his



words were more about the past than the future until singer Mahalia Jackson heckled: "Tell them about the dream, Martin!" So he did.

But I realised I didn't know nearly as much as I should have done. I didn't know he was born Michael King Jr – but changed his name when his dad did. I didn't know he had a white best friend aged six, who played ball with him until they were told that playtime was over, forever, due to their differences in skin colour. I underestimated the role of television in amplifying his message; if he were born a decade earlier, he wouldn't have reached the millions of white viewers that he needed to reach to change society. I knew, sadly, of his brutal end – but what a life and faith well-lived.

But who else to bring to the pages of these children's books?

The earliest name we went for was Edward Jenner: the vaccine guy. He has quite a claim – that he saved more lives than anyone else in history! All thanks to a milk maid inspiring Edward to deliberately infect a boy's scab with a dose of cow pox. (It's a gruesome tale, but Horrible Histories goes down rather well, so hey.) This staved off smallpox for the lad – so the cow, the boy, the milk maid and Edward made medical history. Edward then chose to give away that vaccine so the world could benefit,

while he didn't. What a testament to his fantastic faith and generosity.


Edith Cavell was another name I knew a little about – but too little. As a nurse in the First World War, she gave up the safety of her family home in Norfolk to work in a frontline Belgian hospital. She helped injured soldiers on all sides of the war – then smuggled people out of the country, paying for it with her life.

"Standing as I do in view of God and eternity," she said, "I realise that patriotism is not enough. I must have no hatred or bitterness towards anyone."

Researching these books, I met new people, like John Harper, a pastor who may never have entered the history books had it not been for a boat ticket he bought, for the Titanic. As it sank, he refused to be helped so that he could help others, even evangelising as he swam in the freezing waters. "I am John Harper's last convert," said the man he saved, in more ways than one.

Then there's Jesse Owens is known to many as the athlete who stood up to Hitler. Or Pandita Ramabai, widowed far too young, then told that her life was now over, so she became a hugely influential single mum – travelling, teaching and helping abandoned children and child widows.

Harriet Tubman is increasingly being taught in schools – escaping her slave masters, using God as a sat-nav when she didn't know which tree



to hide behind or which path to run down, then returning multiple times to rescue friends and family via the Underground Railroad.

Perhaps my favourite story from Fantastically Faithful Heroes Who Gave Their All for God is Corrie Ten Boom – because she has three amazing lives in one. She hid Jewish refugees in her 'Hiding Place' – behind the fake wall in her bedroom. She endured a prison camp, smuggling in a Bible and running church-style meetings in the darkest of places. Then after the war, she met the prison guard responsible for her sis-

ter's death, who begged her forgiveness. What a fantastically faithful hero she was!

If only I had time to tell you about book two – Fantastically Faithful World Changers Who Gave Their All for God – with names such as John Newton, the slave ship captain who became a slave then fought against it all, along the way writing Amazing Grace (as well as some very rude songs about Christians... in his early days).

Or the 'angel of prisons' Elizabeth Fry, the Quaker activist who transformed conditions for women and children, then ended up on the five pound note (that was a challenge in this children's book – I felt I had to explain what bank notes were...)

We meet Thomas Barnardo, the name behind the orphan charity and high street shops, who rescued countless children from London's streets. And George Washington Carver – born into slavery but destined for a life of peanut-farming, education and peanut-farming (he loved peanuts).

Rosa Parks is a name familiar to many, after her moment of resistance and the bus boycotts that followed. Wangari Maathai may not be so well-known: a Kenyan environmentalist who wondered if God would still think his created world was good – and if not, what we can do about it.

I wish I had time to write here about the peaceful protests of Christian Fuhrer in East Germany, whose 'Peace Prayer' movement defiantly



stood up against an oppressive regime (they would even break into his house and move his sock drawer around just to unsettle him).

Or Joni Eareckson Tada – the only one of our characters still living – who has used her paralysis to campaign for people with disabilities, bringing dignity, hope and yes, a good dose of faith.

But I don't have space here to tell you those stories. If only two books existed called Fantastically Faithful Heroes Who Gave Their All for God and Fantastically Faithful World Changers Who Gave Their All for God, published by SPCK and out now.

OH HANG ON A MINUTE... they do exist! (I know that for a fact because my cupboard has two hundred of them.)

Paul's books are out now, available from wherever you buy books... or from Paul's cupboard. See him at All Saints' Church most Sundays for a signed copy!

We used to collect blister packs at church and take them to Superdrug. Sadly, Superdrug stopped taking them but now Boots has picked up the reins with their recycling scheme.

The recycling bins are downstairs in the Boots on Guildford High Street. As well as blister packs you can also recycle dental waste and other beauty, health and wellness waste.



They have an app and a system of scanning your waste and collecting advantage points.

However, if you don't want to be bothered with that, you can simply take your waste to the bins and pop it in.

VOLCANO ON LANZAROTE

At the end of February to early March we had a lovely holiday in Lanzarote with friends. While there we went on a trip to Timanfaya National Park.

This park covers Cuervo volcano which was the first to explode into activity on September 1st 1730. For six years there were tremors, noise, explosions, flames, ash, and volcanic dust, but also the earth opened and a river of larva flowed from one side of the island to the other.



The river of larva swallowed ten villages and covered the most fertile land on the island. Many residents left for Cuba and South America. A large number joined Spanish settlers in Texas in 1731.

When we were in Lanzarote we learnt about one man who recorded these events in his diary. Father Andrès Lorenzo Curbelo was the parish priest of a fishing village called Yaiza.

Miraculously the lava divided round Yaiza and it survives in a sea of larva. Only about 600 people live there now.

Vulcanologists are grateful to Father Andrès' diaries as they are a first-hand account from a survivor of an eruption.


When in Lanzarote one man had more influence than anyone else: César Manrique. His childhood friend Pepin Ramirez was President of the is-



land. Together they have preserved the unique landscape. No house can be above two stories and has to be white. They both saw what was happening elsewhere on the other islands. On the whole island there is one tall building; it is an hotel in the capital. There are no tall advertising billboards or intrusive road signs. It is very different.

BIG BUILD UPDATE



At last we are moving forward. The DAC has approved our basic design plans with a caveat that the heating plan will need to be submitted when known.

We have received a letter of tentative approval from our insurers acknowledging that we are applying for a faculty.

We now have to display the Public Notice and Certificate of Publication for 30 days inside and outside the church. After this it is returned to the diocesan registrar.

In the meantime, we have instructed the architects to proceed with preparing all the forms for a full planning application to Guildford Borough Council. The architects will also start working on the production of the construction drawings, construction information, construction details and the Building Regulations.

The steering group has agreed that we should delay the meeting with the wider community about our plans until the planning procedures are completed. This should be hopefully soon after the summer break.

We have almost reached our first financial target of raising £300,000. Currently we have raised over £275k and the total continues to grow with your kind help. Some initial work has been carried out by the Finance Vision Group searching for suitable schemes offering grants to churches.


Moment of Fox





















Easter Uncut - what really happened and why it really matters

Most diaries are boring. This one isn't.

Easter Uncut takes readers to one man's account of a week of his life: a week of great plans, shattered dreams, nightmare scenes and renewed hope. It's what we call Easter, without any of the fluffy bits.

This accessible, faithful book will engage, inform and excite non-Christians and Christians by taking them to the uncut Easter story, and to the wonder of the message of the cross and empty tomb.



Women of Holy Week - an Easter journey in nine stories

In the style of her bestselling Phoebe, Paula Gooder uses her extensive biblical expertise to retell the events of the Crucifixion, Resurrection and Ascension through the eyes of nine female characters she imagines accompanying Jesus during these momentous days.

Accompanied by nine colour illustrations, each story brings to life the tension, drama and shock of the events of Holy Week, banishing any over-familiarity and helping readers enter into the Passion narrative in a deeper, more meaningful way.

Originally given as a series of addresses at Southwark Cathedral during Holy Week 2021, these nine stories are for all who long to encounter Jesus afresh through the Easter Story.

THE REAL EASTER

In CS Lewis's The Lion, the Witch and the Wardrobe, the lion Aslan is put to death by the White Witch. The stone table on which he is killed cracks in two, but Aslan meets with Lucy and Susan alive again. He explains the Witch's failure:

"Her knowledge goes back only to the dawn of time. But if she could have looked a little further back, she would have known that when a willing victim who had committed no treachery was killed in a traitor's stead, the Table would crack, and Death itself would start working backwards."

This is a great picture of what Jesus' cross and His resurrection have achieved. As Paul writes, 'I want to know Christ, to know the power of His resurrection' (Philippians 3:10). To understand the real Easter, we should experience the same power that raised Jesus from the dead!

New Hope: Like the girls in the story, Easter highlights the sadness and confusion that loss brings. Yet the resurrection of Jesus brings new hope, as it demonstrates the victory secured by the cross over sin, Satan and death. We can face life's difficulties knowing that Jesus walks beside us.

New Love: Our relationships are often characterised by a lack of forgiveness, hurt and betrayal. Yet Jesus' resurrection opens the possibility of new love, as His power enables us to accept others and forgive them.

New Life: When we are trying to make sense of life, like the girls in the story, Jesus offers us a living relationship with Himself. It's a friendship with God through Jesus that can begin today and continue for eternity.


When Lucy met Aslan again, she cried: 'Oh, you're real, you're real!' We too can find the real Easter through a life changing encounter with the living Christ.






