THOUGHTS FROM THE VICARAGE



The focus of August this year, for us as a family, is watching and waiting for our 3rd grandchild to arrive – due on the 21st of the month. This little one is expected by our younger daughter Lydia and her husband Sam, who are living and working up in Durham. We're very much looking forward to the first cousin in our family, for our grandsons Natti and Joel. And I'm beginning to think it's time to get my bag packed, ready to make the journey

north when the big day arrives!

August is often a time of watching and waiting – sometimes with a sense of expectation and excitement, and at others with a mix of anxiety or concern. That may well be true for children in our congregation who are preparing to make the transition to a new school: maybe Onslow Infants, Queen Eleanor's or County. For others it might mean preparing to go to university for the first time, or starting a first job. For the more senior members among us we often find ourselves waiting – for news from the family, for hospital appointments and results, for whatever the 'next stages' of our lives might entail.

Jesus knew what it was to watch and to wait; and we see that clearly in the Garden of Gethsemane on the night before he died (Mark 14:32-42). Here Jesus entreated his disciples to 'keep watch' with him. Jesus also understood the joy of waiting in anticipation; and we see that very clearly after his Ascension, as he commanded his disciples to 'wait' for the gift his Father had promised (Acts 1:4). On both those occasions Jesus' intention was that his disciples should both watch and pray. Prayerful watching and waiting with Jesus is the best way to approach the joys and challenges that lie ahead.

During this month of August, let's remember that call to 'watch and pray'; and my prayer for you is that as you take delight in the Lord, he will grant you the desires of your heart (Psalm 37:4).

Wyc iffe MISSION FOCUS: Bib e WYCLIFFE BIBLE TRANSLATORS Trans ators

All Saints have supported Andrew and Clare Koens for many years, as

they work for Wycliffe Bible Translators in Papua New Guinea. Clare teaches and provides support and care for mission workers and their families, while Andrew repairs motorcycles and other small equipment so that mission workers are able to get around.



Andrew Koens is from the USA, and spent his teenage years as a missionary kid in Peru. Clare is from the UK (many at All Saints know Clare personally) and met Andrew after travelling to Papua New Guinea to teach the children of those working at Wycliffe. They live at Ukarumpa with their three children **Levi, Heidi and Eowyn**.

Wycliffe's vision is for "a world where everyone can know Jesus through the Bible", and their mission is "to serve local partners worldwide as they bring God's word to their communities in the language which speaks to them best."

1 in 5 people worldwide are still without a bible in their own language.

Bible translation has always been integral to God's mission. The church in Damascus that Saul intended to persecute in Acts 9 became a centre for mission. The first translation of the Scriptures in the Christian era was into Syriac around 170AD as spoken in Damascus. Gradually there were translations in Armenia, Georgia, Samarkand and beyond. By 382AD there was the Vulgate translation by Jerome into Latin from the Hebrew.

In the middle ages the Venerable Bede translated the gospel of John into Old English; later John Wycliffe translated the scriptures from the Vulgate into Middle English. There were also translations into Hungarian and Bohemian. After the fall of Constantinople in 1453 scholars fled to

Paris, London and Rotterdam bringing their knowledge of both Greek and Hebrew texts – and by 1600 printed versions of the entire Bible had appeared in 15 European languages.

In the 20th and 21st centuries Wycliffe Bible Translators have been working alongside communities around the world, training local people to translate the Bible, and developing specialist software to help with this.

Papua New Guinea (PNG) has the largest number of languages in the world (840) and many of these languages still do not have any translated scripture.

Papua New Guinea is one of two countries which share the Island of New Guinea, the second biggest island in the world. The other half of the island is part of Indonesia. Most of the island is tropical rain forest, and has a range of mountains called the Highlands. Travel between communities is difficult which is one of the reasons the country has so many different languages. PNG is part of the Pacific "Ring of Fire" so it experiences earthquakes (2022 had a large earthquake), mud slides (a large scale disaster in May 2024, and ten other fatal landslides so far this year) tsunamis and volcanic eruptions. Andrew and Clare were safe – as were their colleagues – but affected by what was happening to so many others in the country they live in.

Clare has recently increased her responsibilities in the Staff Care department as two colleagues left in May.

Clare has been:

- **★** Conducting interviews/debriefs for those leaving the country.
- ★ Linking people with resources outside PNG.
- ★ Arranging and leading critical incident debriefs after people go through difficult events.
- ★ Helping with conflict resolution.
- ★ Organising seminars (they had one on resilience last month).
- ★ Organising logistics for visiting pastors and counsellors.
- ★ Supporting parents through courses, workshops and coaching.

Clare and Andrew need to raise their own financial support so that they can continue in their supporting roles enabling the translators to work out in the remote villages. All Saints gives to their work every year, from the part of church income which is set aside for Mission giving, and in addition we have

Below is a list of some of their costs in 2022, which gives an idea of their current expenses.

- \star £200 Annual motorcycle registration
- \star £20 A week's worth of fruit and vegetables, bought from people in surrounding villages who bring them to market each week
- ★ £130 The monthly fee for having security personnel protecting our home and personal safety.
- ★ £100 A month's worth of electricity for our home.
- ★ £300 The monthly premium for our health insurance (including medical evacuations).
- ★ £50 Our monthly internet flat-rate charge

- ★ £240 Dog containment unit to keep a dog on our property without it running away (a big security help)
- ★ £120 Colour printer to use for school, communication and special projects
- ★ £20 one pair of Crocs for our children to grow into
- ★ £12 French horn rental for Heidi for one school term

There are 28 chapters in Acts – if we could get sponsorship adding up to £25 per chapter this would raise £700! Any sponsorship – from a few pence to many pounds will be welcome!

ALL SAINTS' BIG BUILD UPDATE

After nearly a year of working out how the foyer should be extended to provide a better welcoming area for All Saints, the floor plan has been completed. We are proudly displaying it on the notice board in the

church. Why not come and have a look at it? You will see a new entrance into the church. This will be primarily used during the construction phase and afterwards as a fire exit for the church. You will also see the new chair store and of course the redesigned foyer. Finally you will notice the elimination of the library and chapel areas which were being adversely affected by subsidence.

We will be pressing on with the plans and submitting them to the Diocesan Advisory Committee for approval when it next meets in early October. The Community Audit will be used to support our proposal which we trust will lead to a submission to the Planning Department of Guildford Borough Council.

After the Diocesan approval we will start on the structural aspects of the project and be able to get a more accurate costing of the work. Currently the Finance Vision Group is working on a strategy for raising the funds needed. In the interim, events are being organised which will raise funds to help pay for the professional fees being incurred.

THE CATHEDRAL TOUR ENDS IN BANGOR

The final leg of our challenge took us to Saint Deiniol's Cathedral in the Welsh city of Bangor. It's a long way to Bangor, so we tied it in with a holiday on the beautiful island of Anglesey.

The site of the present building of Bangor Cathedral has been in use as a place of Christian worship since the sixth century. The ca-



thedral was built on a low-lying and inconspicuous site, possibly so as not to attract the attention of Viking raiders from the sea in ancient times.

A monastery first occupied the site but was ransacked in 634 and then again in 1073. Restoration began from 1120. Destruction occurred again in 1211 by King John's army. Further rebuilding occurred only for the cathedral to be burnt to the ground in 1402. Reconstruction was again completed in 1532.

During our visit we were lucky to see two contemporary paintings by the artist John Granville Gregory. Both paintings are modern interpretations of paintings by Caravaggio, 'Entombment' and 'Doubting Thomas'.

Another notable item in the cathedral is the 'Mostyn Christ' carved in oak and thought to date from the late 15th century. It's rather damaged with Christ having only half an arm.

As we were leaving the cathedral we noticed a garden just below the cathedral. At the entrance is a sign 'Bible Garden'. We looked it up and it seems this pretty and tranquil garden was established by the late Dr Tatham Whitehead who was a botany professor at the University College of

North Wales. The professor's aim was to plant all the plants and trees that are mentioned in the bible, in the order that they are mentioned!

Apparently 148 species were identified for inclusion! To be honest, the garden looks a little overgrown and to my untrained eye it was tricky to identify species. With the help of Google, I think we spotted some Hypericum (St John's Wort). Although I can't find reference to it in the Bible, it does apparently grow in the Holy Land.

Anyway, what a nice project and perhaps I should suggest it to our Orchard Project team!

And so the cathedral tour ends and we have enjoyed it immensely! It has made us travel this beautiful country that we live in, seeing places we would probably never have seen.

GUILDFORD TOWN CENTRE CHAPLAINCY (GTCC) VOLUNTEER CHAPLAIN NEWS

We have been really encouraged by the positive interest in Workplace Chaplaincy in a wide range of settings and in the number of volunteers. Our volunteers are



nonjudgmental and provide a caring, listening presence.

Since the successful placement of our first Chaplain in a GPs surgery in 2021, we were delighted to recruit our third volunteer GP chaplain in 2023. They offer appointments for anyone who needs someone to talk to, so freeing up GPs time. Feedback from GPs is that this service is exceptionally helpful and brings positive outcomes. We aspire to extend this service to further surgeries in the local area. We also have Chaplains serving in a diverse range of other settings, including a women's hostel, a retirement complex and with Surrey Police. All are very much in demand. We have introduced an informal prayer meeting at St. Mary's Church in Quarry Street, meeting at noon on the first Tuesday of every month. This offers GTCC supporters the opportunity to come together, encourage each other and to pray for GTCC and our town.

The 'Pilot' scheme to have a Volunteer Chaplain in a GP surgery is now three years on. With the help and support of the medical, admin, nursing, pharmacy and ancillary staff at the Practice, it is now a recognised and appreciated part of what Binscombe Medical Centre offers to its patients.

I am at the surgery on a Friday afternoon and see up to three patients (usually referred by the patient's GP) for approximately 45 mins and am simply there to LISTEN. The aim is to connect with and support those who are struggling with day-to-day problems and challenges and encourage them in their efforts to find a meaningful and positive way forward. Some patients come just once, others may return for several ap-

pointments. Sometimes patients present with particular issues such as bereavement, relationship difficulties, anxiety, depression, feelings of low self-worth; sometimes they are simply overwhelmed by 'life'.

Some feedback from patients:

- ★ 'Thank you so much, just talking has been really helpful'
- ★ 'Thank you for listening.... It's helped me to think more clearly'
- ★ 'It's good to talk and have a conversation'
- ★ 'I feel so much better having got all that off my chest'
- ★ 'Nobody is interested in my problems.'

Being a Volunteer Chaplain is a wonderful role; every person is unique and precious to God and being there to 'listen' can be immensely reassuring and affirming for those who are really struggling with life and feeling overwhelmed by their circumstances.








Racing for Glory - Eric Liddell's 1924 Olympic story By Graham Daniels and Jonny Reid, 10Publishing, £3.99

One hundred years ago this summer, all eyes were on Paris for the 1924 Olympic Games. Among the world's finest athletes stood sprinter Eric Liddell of Great Britain. But holding true to his convictions, he chose not

to enter his best race – the 100 metres – and instead changed the 400 metres discipline forever.

This brief biography explores Liddell's extraordinary life and how his faith in Jesus motivated everything he did.




