THOUGHTS FROM THE VICARAGE




As Easter is early this year (31st March), Lent is earlier than usual too. We begin the season with a Shrove Tuesday pancake party on 13th February, followed by Ash Wednesday the next day as Lent begins.

As we've done over the course of many years, we'll be offering a Lent course once again. The course will be

held via Zoom, during the five Wednesday evenings in Lent. This year

the Worship Vision Group has chosen the Archbishop of Canterbury's Lent Book 2024, 'Tarry Awhile:
Wisdom from Black Spirituality for People of Faith',
by Selina Stone. It's a remarkable book, exploring a
Black Christian spiritual practice called 'Tarrying' –
waiting on God, in the midst of often wearying
times. The practice originates in Jesus' words to his
disciples, in the garden of Gethsemane: 'My soul is
overwhelmed with sorrow to the point of death.
Stay here and watch with me'. Through the book
we're invited to wait with Jesus, opening ourselves
to a genuine encounter with God and between ourselves.



The book makes the wisdom of Black spiritualities and faith available for all people. It focuses on seven themes: darkness as a place of encounter with the divine; the unity of all things; movement, belonging and migration; the Spirit as one who moves in unexpected ways; quiet contemplation as essential to spiritual growth; healing in community; and weeping that turns to joy.

Dr Selina Stone is a Postdoctoral Research Associate at Durham University, and a much sought-after speaker and preacher. She comes from an Afro-Caribbean background, and was brought up in inner city Birmingham. Her experience of growing up within a black-majority church in that city, has informed her understanding of a uniquely 'black' spirituality. There are riches and treasures here for us to discover and to own for ourselves. So do come and join us, as we begin this journey in faith together.

MISSION FOCUS: GLOBAL HOPE IN ACTION WORKING WITH REFUGEES IN ARMENIA



What do you know about Armenia?

Until I became friends with an Armenian family living in Britain, I would have struggled to find it on a map, or told you anything about its rich and troubled history.

Did you know that Armenia was the first country in the world to proclaim itself Christian (in 301AD) and that its culture is still Orthodox Christian? Or that 1.5 million Armenians died in the 1915 genocide? Since this small, landlocked, mountainous country became independent from



USSR (Russia) in 1991, it has struggled economically. It's a forgotten corner, wedged between Georgia, Turkey, Iran and Azerbaijan, only making our news from time to time when its conflicts with neighbour Azerbaijan flare up.

What is Global Hope In Action?

In 2024, All Saints will be supporting work in Armenia through Global Hope In Action. GHIA is a Christian humanitarian aid organisation (formerly known as Global Hope Network International UK), which was founded in 2012 and renamed in 2022.



Global Hope In Action's aim is "to provide help for some of the world's poorest communities, transforming lives and restoring dignity and hope. We work with people whose lives have been fractured by conflict and chronic poverty, doing so in partnership with local churches or Christian charities." Currently projects are in Armenia, Jordan, Nigeria, India and Sri Lanka.

The Development Work in Armenia

In Armenia, GHIA has been working in the rural north near the town of Spitak since 2015. Initially helping Syrian refugees, it has more recently focused on the needs of Armenian communities near Spitak which have suffered from high unemployment and social deprivation for many years.

Working mainly through local partners, Calvary Church Jrashen, a member of the Evangelical Church of Armenia, it has been supporting family and income generation programmes such as a sewing machine training scheme or improving crop production. In spring 2023, they funded the drilling of a borehole and associated pipework to irrigate local fields more effectively. The project was highly successful and the harvest for summer 2023 "way beyond" what was expected.

Parenting courses

With up to 70% of working age men having to travel abroad for work, parenting courses for single mothers have become very popular. In 2023, they continued to fund several of these courses, which are based on a UK course called 'Kids Matter', translated into Armenian. Summer and winter outreach programmes for children have been popular with the families.

October 2023 - Emergency Aid for a New Refugee Crisis

More recently, a huge number of ethnic Armenian refugees have fled from Nagorno-Karabakh into Armenia after Azerbaijan took over the enclave in September 2023. The Spitak region alone has had to absorb over 10,000 refugees (the town of Spitak has a population of 11,000). The community is in desperate need of help - they are already fully stretched as they respond to the need for food, accommodation, clothing for winter, blankets etc, and GHIA has been sending funds to enable the Church to do all they can as part of this enormous relief effort.

Support from All Saints for Global Hope In Action

All Saints will be inviting a speaker to explain their work at a Sunday service later in the year. In the meantime, please pray for Armenia and especially for the Calvary Church Jrashen and its pastor, Mxitar Hakobyan, as they reach out to many in need and show the love of Jesus in action. REVISION OF ELECTORAL ROLL 2024

In accordance with the Church Representation Rules, the Church Electoral Roll has to be revised annually and this will be done in February, prior to the Annual Parochial Church Meeting (APCM) in March.

The planned timetable is that the formal 14 day notice of the revision will be posted in the church lobby on Sunday 4th February. The revision period will begin on Sunday 18th February and end on Saturday 2nd March. On Sunday 3rd March the revised Roll will be posted and no changes can then be made until the conclusion of the APCM on Sunday 17th March.

Whilst the main purpose of the revision is to remove any names of people no longer eligible, it is a good opportunity for new people to enrol. Enrolment forms can be downloaded from the church website. Completed forms can either be scanned and emailed to all-saintschurchgfd@gmail.com or posted to: Electoral Roll Officer, All Saints' Church, Vicarage Gate, Onslow Village, Guildford, GU2 7QJ.

By enrolling, you will become a voting member of the Church of England and be entitled to vote at the APCM on matters such as electing the Parochial Church Council and our representatives on the Deanery Synod, and also be eligible for election to church appointments.

To qualify for inclusion on the roll, you must be baptised and aged 16 or over and a member of the Church of England. You should also either be resident in the parish or, if not resident, then have habitually attended public worship in the parish during the six months prior to enrolment. It is also possible for members of other churches to enrol under certain conditions.

BRENDA HORSLEY: REFLECTIONS

Memories of those who knew and loved her at All Saints

I remember meeting Brenda back in 2015, when I first became vicar here at All Saints. I remember her being a lively person, with a zest for life, and love of family, friends and neighbours.



In her early years at All Saints Brenda was a member of the 'Young Wives' group, when the family lived in High View Road, and then in Manor Way; and her contemporaries were people such as Tom and Joan New, and Mary Bassett, whom some of us will remember.

When Geoff sadly died in 1984, Brenda became more deeply involved at All Saints. It was that year that she joined the Electoral Roll, and started to become a very regular worshipper. Richard and Sandra Pointer remember her sitting in the pew in front of them – in the days we still had pews! – and chatting after services. Brenda would tell them of her holidays with her great friend Doris Greenacre, another very longstanding member of All Saints, who also sadly died last year. Richard and Sandra have fond memories of Brenda looking after their pet rabbit one year, while they were on holiday.

I too remember Doris talking about the holidays she and Brenda had shared together; they were as important for Doris, another person sadly widowed at a young age, as they were for Brenda.

Brenda contributed to the life of All Saints in a number of ways. She was regularly in charge of the plant stall at the summer fete, an event that still continues today – although now in the early autumn rather than the summer. Peter Nicholls now follows in Brenda's footsteps, and the plant stall remains a hugely loved part of our annual fairs. Plants and flowers were important for Brenda, as was the garden she created at 17 East Meads. She marked Geoff's death each year by providing the flowers in church, as a memorial to him.

Apart from Sunday worship, Brenda was also a member of the 'Ladies Lunch', run by Annie Cox and Marguerite Barclay. At this monthly event in Annie's home, Brenda was able to enjoy a delicious meal, and the company of many from both All Saints and the wider community, who became firm friends. Brenda, as we know, was sociable and loved company, and the Ladies Lunch was an important part of her monthly calendar.

Friends from All Saints visited Brenda when she moved to Wey Valley House in Farnham. Among those were Diana Reiblein and Annie Cox, who had known Brenda for many years. They would bring back news of Brenda and the family, keeping the connection with All Saints and Onslow Village going. Cards were sent and relationships continued, so that Brenda continues to be a known and loved member of our church, and this community today.

We had tables of various sizes set up in the church to suit different games and players, from dominoes to Dobble. There was also a kids' ar-




ea, with mats, toddler sized tables and chairs, books and games, enclosed by chairs for those that wanted to play safely on the floor.

It is often said today that we celebrate the life of someone passing, rather than mourn the dead. In mother's case we really must grasp this celebration.

She was a mother to three - Jane, me and Barry; grandmother to nine - Ben, Mark, Michelle, Stuart, Alix, Evie, Miranda, Tristan and Rowan; and great grandmother to nine - Lucy, Amy, Romeo, Madi, Alfie, Elliott, Oscar, Mya and Bella-Marie, all of whom she was immensely proud of.

Sadly she was never to meet Bella-Marie (ninth great granddaughter) who only arrived on the 20th December, increasing the family to a total of 21. I'm not sure why we are worried about a few rubber boats arriving in Dover, when mother and father did a pretty good job of increasing the population by themselves.

Born in Guildford, she initially lived in Beech Grove adjacent to the now Tesco store, which was all open fields at the time, belonging to the Weavers Estate.

In fact she only told me a few weeks ago that the Infant School in Onslow Village is where the milking sheds were situated for Weavers Farm. She would often walk there to see the cows being milked from their Beech Grove estate, when the A3 was just a small minor road, with her long term friend Edwina, and also Sheila Green. Mother's friendship with Sheila was re-kindled when they lost their respective husbands in recent years.

She attended what was then Queen Eleanor's Secondary School, where she became Head Girl, a role she continuously reminded us of.

When she left school, she was employed by Dennis commercial vehicle manufacturers, in the typing pool where she met my father, a typewriter mechanic at the time. He often visited her desk, making sure her ribbons were in order, her shift and tabulator keys functioned correctly, and never afraid to press the back space and carriage return lever to generate more possible repairs. They eventually married in 1952 in the crypt of the then work in progress Guildford Cathedral.

After moving house four times, mother enjoyed returning to Onslow Village from Godalming. She soon became active again with All Saints, and was amongst many old friends including Jean and Tony Read, a few doors away.

She enjoyed the local community clubs and gatherings including the gardening club at the village hall. She also really enjoyed the many baking competitions, and appeared to be pretty successful.

We have always admired mother's determination and drive to stay fit and young, from keep fit classes in her early years to yoga with her friends in the Woking Group, right up until three days before she left us. After my father's passing on Christmas Eve 2007, she was more determined than ever to lead an active life. Christmas was a time of mixed emotions; this led her to spend the first few years transporting the oldies (as she called them), to a couple of community centres for their Christmas lunches, until the authorities intervened, forcing her to apply for a criminal record check, and at this point she decided her duties were complete.

Always determined to remain active, she brought Poppy into her life. Poppy gave her renewed purpose and company in her busy life. On every dry day possible, Poppy would be driven to Broadwater lake in Godalming for her favourite walk. They both massively enjoyed this trip and were equally disappointed when the weather prevented this daily outing, which normally concluded with a trip to the Co-op in Farncombe on the way home.

Mother dearly loved regular trips out with her sister Anita, and visiting her dearest friend Edwina. On a weekly basis she would go with her friend Cath to visit Queenie (our first next door neighbour) who she had known since moving there in1954. She also maintained connections with her friends and work colleagues from Cornhill Insurance.

Let us REALLY celebrate the long, full and healthy life of this kind, thoughtful and generous lady. She remains my hero and mentor always.


AN UNHAPPY CHRISTMAS IN BETHLEHEM

While understandably the focus has been on the war in Gaza following the terrible attack by Hamas on 7th October, there has been a less well-reported effect on the occupied territories of the West Bank. In Bethlehem, where the suppliers I deal with for my fair trade stall are, the effect was disastrous.

Tourism was only just beginning to return after the pandemic. I last visited in early 2022, when getting into Israel meant that you had to take a Covid test on arrival and run the risk of having to isolate in your hotel room for a week. Things had improved by Christmas 2022, but they were really pinning their hopes on Christmas 2023. Both of the suppliers I use had kick-started the small family firms that supply them by providing them with seasoned olive wood to carve ready for the expected tourist influx.

Then the attack of 7th October happened, followed by the war, and although the West Bank is run by a rival Palestinian faction to Hamas (Fatah), the checkpoints were initially all closed. Only one of the three checkpoints into Bethlehem has been reopened, as far as I can find out - the least accessible one. Palestinians who used to have passes to work in Israel were refused entry, and therefore lost the income they used to bring home. Worst of all, flights to Israel stopped and there were no tourists – and tourism is the major economy in Bethlehem.

There were reports that Christmas had been cancelled in Bethlehem. It would be more accurate to say that it was marked but not celebrated. For reasons that no-one can really explain, Christmas is normally celebrated



with a parade of Scouts and bagpipers leading a procession of visiting clergy from Jerusalem (either Orthodox at the start of Advent, or Catholic for Christmas Eve).

The processions went ahead, but without the music and celebration. There was no Christmas tree in Manger Square; instead there was a symbolic nativity scene set in rubble as everyone remembered what was happening in Gaza.

The Christmas Eve service in the Catholic church of the nativity, which normally attracts a ticket-only congregation from around the world, was attended by local

Christians only, faithfully preserving the tradition of worship at the Grotto of the Nativity since at least the 4th century.

The future is still very uncertain. Some tourists are beginning to return to Israel, but mostly Jews rather than Christians, so they are unlikely to visit Bethlehem. Israel is predicting a war of several months, and Hamas is still sporadically firing rockets into the south of Israel. The tensions that already existed in the West Bank because of the Israeli settlements there are growing, and in some places becoming more violent. There is a risk of a second front in the war to the north with Lebanon, and the possibility that the situation in the West Bank could develop into a full-scale conflict.


It's hard to have hope, but perhaps the one positive thing to have come out of the tragedy is a renewed urgency in the international community to get to grips with a problem that they have ignored for the past two decades.

BIG BUILD UPDATE

We have received two further survey reports - one from the quantity surveyor and the other from the structural engineer. The former included a revision for the inclusion of electrical work which has increased the overall cost to just over £1 million. The latter pointed

out that the library roof has begun to move sufficiently to pull out its fixings to the large lintel beam. It also confirmed that the window wooden mullions played no part in supporting the roof. However it acknowledged the difficulty of introducing secondary or double glazing. We are awaiting the outcome of the recent geotechnical survey.

The cost rise led to discussion about the necessity of the proposed 'bandstand' space. No decision about this will be taken until the outcome of the ongoing community audit is known. The audit is seeking ideas, comments and the needs of our local community. We are contacting a wide spectrum of people ranging from local politicians and schools to church hall and church user groups. We hope to have the audit completed by mid-February.

The fundraising group has already swung into action with their first successful community event - see Sophie's article on page 12. The finance team has begun to look at the possibility of applying for grants from a number of sources including the National Churches Trust.

NORTH GUILDFORD FOOD BANK - A LOOK BACK AT 2023

After another busy year at North Guildford Food Bank I am writing to thank you so much for the support you have provided us in the past year. We have so many donors who give either produce or financial support and without you all, we would not have been able to serve the number of people we did in 2023: we provided 1,709 food parcels, feeding 2,669 adults and 2072 children. This was a small increase of 43 parcels from the previous year.

The main reasons for needing help this year were unemployment and debt. Our main referrers were Guildford Borough Council, Home School Link Workers and Citizens Advice.


Since early 2023 we have not provided funding for fuel vouchers, instead partnering with The Fuel Bank Foundation. We refer our clients on prepayment meters, who are in fuel poverty, to the Fuel Bank Foundation and they provide fuel vouchers. The value of these vouchers varies depending on the time of year, but the aim is to provide sufficient fuel funding to last the household a week.

Guildford Council Wellbeing Team is continuing to provide a driver and van on Wednesdays to take parcels to clients who need them to be delivered and we have volunteer drivers to do deliveries on other days for clients who are housebound. Robin (GBC) is also very helpful in bringing boxes from supermarkets for us to pack parcels into.

Christmas 2023

In the two weeks before Christmas, we saw demand like never before, and in December served 306 clients, compared to 200 in December last year. We are blessed to have some reserves in the bank so that we were able to buy more stock, in addition to food donations, which was needed on an almost daily basis. Our monthly spend on food more than doubled in December and our healthy stock levels were reduced to nothing for many foods.

As last year, we increased our regular client sessions from three to four per week for the two weeks before Christmas. Due to the large numbers of clients, our volunteers started packing food parcels much earlier than normal and when demand was highest, we staggered client arrival times. We also provided Tesco vouchers to our clients in December, in addition to their food parcels, giving them the opportunity to buy extra items for their families over Christmas. We are very thankful for Guildford Lions who continue to buy eggs, potatoes and carrots for us each week. They have been so supportive, even when we had such an increase in demand.



We are in the process of building our stocks and reserves up again, so please look on <u>our Facebook page</u> and website - <u>northguildfordfoodbank.co.uk/food-donations</u> - for our weekly requests. We are also so thankful to those of you who donate financially to the food bank as food donations alone are not sufficient to meet the needs of the number of clients who are being referred to us.
