

ALL SAINTS SERVICES AND OPENING TIMES

Our pattern of services is as follows:

- ★ Morning Prayer takes place Monday to Wednesday at 9.15am in the church and via Zoom for anyone who would like this option.
- ★ A service of Holy Communion is held in church every Thursday morning at 9.30am.
- ★ An 8am service of Holy Communion is held in church on the first and third Sundays of the month (the third Sunday will use the Book of Common Prayer).
- **★** Our 10am Sunday services follow this pattern:
 - First Sunday: Café-style Altogether Worship
 - Second, fourth and fifth Sundays:
 Church Family Communion with Children's Church
 - ♦ Third Sunday: Morning Worship with Children's Church Note: Children's Church is term-time only
- ★ Each Sunday, we hold 'Tea-Time Church' at 4pm.

THOUGHTS FROM THE VICARAGE



If you've been coming to All Saints for a while you may know that Guildford Diocese – of which we're a part – is committed to the goal of 'Transforming Church, Transforming Lives'. This is focussed on three key areas: Growing disciples, Growing diversity and Growing community. Each parish is encouraged to explore these goals, and draw up a plan to bring them to life at a local level. As a PCC we review these goals at each of

our meetings, which has been a helpful guide for our ministry and mission at All Saints.

The second of those goals, 'Growing diversity', is very relevant, at a time when Guildford itself is becoming more ethnically diverse. Both Surrey University and the Royal Surrey County Hospital attract growing numbers of people from around the world, and we see that reflected in our schools and wider community. Queen Eleanor's School had 70 children for whom English was an additional language, at the last count.

During this month of February we celebrate that diversity in a variety of ways. Sunday 9th February is 'Racial Justice Sunday', when Anglican churches throughout the country reflect on the importance of racial justice, give thanks for the gifts and beauty of human diversity, and make a commitment to end racism and acts of discrimination. February is also 'Black History Month' in the US and Canada, giving everyone the opportunity to celebrate and understand the impact of black heritage and culture.

As our own church of All Saints becomes more culturally diverse, we give thanks for the contributions of people from all backgrounds and ethnicities, recognising the unique gifts and experiences that each person brings. It's a fulfilment of the words of St Paul: 'There is no longer Jew nor Greek, there is no longer slave nor free, there is no longer male and female, for all of you are one in Christ Jesus' (Galatians 3:28).

MISSION FOCUS: A ROCHA UK

Caring for Creation: The Work of A Rocha UK arocha.org.uk



In a world increasingly aware of environmental challenges, A Rocha UK stands out as a beacon of hope and action. This Christian charity is dedicated to protecting and restoring the natural world, driven by a mission to equip Christians and churches across the UK to care for God's creation.

A Rocha UK's Mission and Vision

A Rocha UK is part of the international A Rocha family, a network of



Christian organisations present in over 20 countries. Its mission is to inspire and mobilise Christians to engage in environmental stewardship, reflecting the biblical mandate to care for the earth. It believes that caring for creation is an integral part of Christian discipleship and a tangible expression of loving our neighbours, both locally and globally.

Eco Church: A Flagship Initiative

One of A Rocha UK's most impactful programs is Eco Church. This initiative provides a comprehensive framework for churches to integrate environmental care into all aspects of church life. Through the Eco Church survey, congregations can assess their environmental impact and work towards Bronze, Silver, or Gold awards. The survey covers five key areas: worship and teaching; buildings and energy; land and nature; community and global engagement; and lifestyle. All Saints is working towards the Eco Church Gold Award at the moment, having already earned Bronze and Silver awards.



Partners in Action

A Rocha UK works with various partners (e.g. church clusters, community groups, schools, farms, forest schools, cathedrals, youth adventure groups and conference and retreat centres) who are committed to conservation. These partnerships enable prac-



tical conservation work, such as habitat restoration and biodiversity monitoring, demonstrating that faith and environmental action can go hand in hand.

Wild Christian: Engaging Individuals and Families

The Wild Christian programme encourages individuals and families to learn how to enjoy, nurture and defend nature, and helps individuals to connect with others who are passionate about creation.

Advocacy and Education

A Rocha UK is also active in advocacy, working to influence policy and public opinion on environmental issues. It supports initiatives like the Climate and Nature Bill, aiming to ensure that the UK government takes decisive action on climate change and biodiversity loss. A Rocha UK pro-

vides educational resources and events to equip churches and individuals with the knowledge and tools needed to make a difference.

At All Saints, as well as supporting A Rocha financially as one of our 2025 mission partners, we are also involved in many practical initiatives. BIG BUILD UPDATE



In terms of our architect's plans, we are almost there. Further to discussions between our architect and the Diocesan Advisory Committee (DAC), a revised set of drawings was discussed by our Steering Committee. These drawings showed slight adjustments to the location of the ramp from the church to the hall and a disabled parking place located close to the hall. The Com-

mittee felt that the ramp could be located against the outside of the new extension so that we didn't lose any of the current parking places. They also felt that the disabled parking space could be in a slightly different location. We hope that the final drawings will be agreed by the end of January. This will then allow the architects to submit the drawings for pre planning approval to Guildford Borough Council.

We are looking at the various eco-friendly ways to heat both the new extension and the existing church building. We are also hoping to get a buildability input from one or two contracting companies.

We are almost there with our financial target of raising £300,000. This amount will help us in facilitating our search for grants. Currently we have raised around £270k. So if you haven't already given and feel able to, visit the <u>church website</u> and see how to make your contribution.

FROM CHURCH TO CHAPLAIN

As part of my Ordination training, I spend some time in a chaplaincy placement. You can choose a school, hospital, business, prison - wherever there might be a chaplaincy. Did you know there's a chaplaincy on the River Wey?

I chose the University of Surrey Chaplaincy. I have spent the past 20 years assessing graduates for programmes, recruiting them and then teaching them the skills they need in risk, finance and underwriting. This is a wonderful opportunity to work with students on the other side of the fence!

I work half a day per week with a 35 strong chaplaincy team - mostly volunteers but three working for the university - across all faiths. It's a big team - but then it serves 16,000 students and 3,500 university employees - that's a small town!!

Everything is at scale. I meet over 200 students every time I am there. Everything that is organised attracts 100s of people. For example, when I first started, I helped at the Remembrance service. It was held outside and there were about 200 people gathering in an outside plaza. I spoke to the media team afterwards who were live-streaming the event. There were another 600 people on line!

Being a chaplain is such a different way of using the gift God has given us. It's taking your faith - compassion and care for people out to the community. Time is spent with the Christian Union, Student Union, the staff and the students. The work is really wide-ranging. I've been serving free drinks to students, serving free lunches to overseas students, carol services and I'm about to liaise with the careers service. This week I'm helping out the Anglican chaplain at a symposium for the nursing and paramedic students when they look at resilience and bad outcomes.

In February I'm lucky enough to help the Friends International team by coaching in their leadership course for overseas students. Then there's Freshers Day for the intake of international students that start Masters degrees. They are expecting between 300 and 500 new students!

I am totally in my element. I just love the pastoral side of ministry and being a chaplain is exactly what this is. Sometimes it's as simple as just striking up a conversation with someone. It's true what they say: within three minutes, you always find something in common.

I'm hoping I might continue my volunteering with the Chaplaincy when my placement finishes. I'll let you know how it goes.

CHURCH ELECTORAL ROLL 2025



In January's magazine readers were advised that, in accordance with Church Representation Rules, an entirely new Church Electoral Roll must be compiled this year. The enrolment period has now started and will continue until the end of February.

As a reminder, to qualify for inclusion on the Roll you must be baptised, over age 16 and a member of the Church of England. You should also be resident in the parish or, if not resident, then have regularly attended All Saints in the last six months.

Enrolment must be done by completing the appropriate form. The easiest way to do this is via an online form: https://bit.ly/as er.

Alternatively, there are paper copies in church or downloadable from the church website: allsaintschurchgfd.org.uk/about-us/electoral-roll/.

Completed forms can either be put in the post box opposite the church office door or emailed to <u>allsaintschurchgfd@gmail.com</u>.

By enrolling, you will become entitled to vote at the Annual Parochial Church Meeting on Sunday 16th March on matters such as electing new members to the Parochial Church Council. You will also be eligible for election to church appointments.

ASPECTS OF ROMANTIC LOVE

God obviously approves of romance – after all, putting Adam and Eve alone together in the Garden of Eden was His idea. And romance has been around ever since.

The history of the Israelites began with three great romances: Abraham and Sarah, Isaac and Rebekah, and Jacob and Rachel. The on-going history of Israel was deeply affected by later romances: Esther and King Xerxes, David's love affair with Bathsheba, and Solomon's marriage to hundreds of foreign wives. There is even an entire book in the Old Testament devoted to the love of a man and woman: the Song of Solomon!

When we reach the New Testament, we find real love between Joseph and Mary (even when Joseph thought Mary had been faithless, he did not want to harm her). St Paul, though himself a bachelor, nevertheless spent a lot of time urging Christians to love and be kind and faithful and considerate to their spouses. He even wrote 1 Corinthians 13 – the great love chapter that is read at millions of weddings worldwide 2000 years later.

Down the centuries ever since, romantic love has been critical in shaping history (Antony and Cleopatra), in shaping cultural ideals (King Arthur and the Knights of the Round Table). Some of our favourite stories are built on romance: Puccini's Tosca, Shakespeare's Romeo and Juliet, Jane

Austen's Pride and Prejudice, Charlotte Bronte's Jane Eyre.

Romance remains as prominent now as it ever was, added to which we have films, television and drama all flying the romantic flag. Wherever we look, whatever we do, romance continues to permeate every aspect of life.

People make amazing sacrifices for love. They defy their family, forsake their culture, turn their back on wealth and position, to be with their loved one. People give their loved ones amazing gifts. Surely the most extravagant was the gift of the Shah Jahan, who built the Taj Mahal in India for his favourite wife, Mumtaz Mahal.

Romance is still alive and well in Britain – last year we sent about 25 million valentines to our beloved ones.

And what of the future? Well, just as the Bible begins with a love story, so it ends with one. And you are involved! For actually the greatest love story of all time is that between God and His people.

Christ is described in Revelation as our heavenly Bridegroom, and the Church is His beloved Bride. He has given us the most expensive present of all – Himself. And, just as in all the best romances, the story will end with the bride and groom getting together at last, so at the end of time, Christ will return for His Bride.

By the grace of God and following His mission on earth, All Saints is a growing pastoral church with a multigenerational congregation and changing demographic within the community of the parish.

The Men's Wellbeing Group is here to meet the needs of both this congregation and the community, building upon the Men's Coffee Morning run by Richard Pointer. The Group is open to any man over 18.

We have a social evening every six weeks and have now set up a group called 'Exploring the Way', led by Martyn Whiteman, that meets to discuss faith in its many forms.

We have met twice as a group in October and December 2024 and are looking forward to exploring how our groups might develop in 2025.

Here are some ideas:

- *Career based*: decisions on career, appraisals, job interviews, underperformance, career change
- Health based: mental well being, physical health, growing older
- Parent based: young people / children, social media challenges, adolescent children, balancing career and home life, stay at home parenting, further education
- Retirement based: pensions, time on your hands, hobbies and interests, volunteering

The dates for the social and Exploring the Way are below.

The evenings start at 7:30pm and finish at 9pm for Exploring the Way and 10pm for the social evenings.

Whilst we were researching for the group, we asked about things that were important to men these days. Here is what they said ...

Physical and Mental Health

A safe space for men to talk about their physical and mental health which would normally be a closed subject. This might include testicular and prostate cancer awareness, work and home anxiety pressures, the need to perform financially at work and the desire to be at home to create a better work/life balance.

Work Related Issues

This enables a sharing of own experiences at work. Perhaps those with experience in this field will be able to help those who need it and become a self-help group. This might range from interview techniques to job applications for those seeking new roles. Leadership skills are complex and there is a wide range of this knowledge within our community. Leadership is often a lonely place, and the group can offer relief from this. This might even include a person who is under underperformance or indeed redundancy stress whilst still having the need to provide for the home.

Younger Generation Issues

Concerns facing the younger generation are very different from those 20 to 30 years ago. These include acknowledging you are a Christian to your peers, climate change, your own sexuality and gender, food poverty, mental health, homelessness and money. The older generation of

the Group will be able to learn from these concerns and also provide help.

Relationship Issues

This might include partner issues, young people issues, the role of the man in the provision for the home and family and in modern times of equality being the second provider in the home behind the partner.

It may include the influence of social media on young people, the values important to youth today, gender and sexuality influences on them.

New Found Faith

This will help men grow in faith and walk with them on this journey. Learning to share decisions men have to take with God is a large step for some men that the group can help with. Equally a man's struggle with faith is also an area the group will be able to help with.

The church is able to offer many resources and the group can assist in making these available to those who seek it and other groups they might wish to join. It may also include taking faith further in occasional preaching, lay leadership and ordination.

Society for a Christian Man

The increasingly secular world may be challenging the life a Christian man wishes to lead. The group can assist in helping the person find time for God in a busy work and home life. There are a number of resources that can help which the group can help the person identify.

This month, we have a poem from *Michael Tanner*, a published poet and a regular at our monthly Men's Coffee morning.


Starlings
