THOUGHTS FROM THE VICARAGE



Over these summer months I've made a start with sorting through my Grandfather's sermons. He, Fredrick Cochran, was a Methodist Lay Preacher, and someone who loved the Bible. After his death I inherited a large box of his sermons, going back to the 1940s and running through until a few years before he died in 2005. I've begun by sorting the sermons into decades (helpfully mostly dated), and I'm beginning to build up a picture of the many churches in which

he preached, and the several churches he led as a Lay Pastor in his 'retirement'. He was still going strong in his late 80s, and has always been a great inspiration to me.

I know some of us have researched our family histories, and discovered all sorts of things about our forebears; the internet is a wonderful thing in that regard. When we dig into our pasts we sometimes find things that give us joy, and help us to understand who we are. We might also find things that challenge or disturb us, and make us question our identity and sense of 'self'.

My grandfather left Ireland in 1945, and found work in Wolverhampton; and as he and his young family looked for accommodation they would have come up against signs that said, 'No Blacks, No Irish, no Dogs'. I've often wondered how they coped with that.

It's a reminder to me that the past, the present and the future are all in God's hands. As we face up to the past, we may find ourselves needing to forgive; to let go of anger, resentment and bitterness. As we live in the present we need to learn from the past, taking inspiration from all that is good, and challenging any darkness we find. As we look to the future we can remember those wonderful words of Jesus, 'Surely I am with you always, to the very end of the age' (Matthew 28:20).

And may the Lord bless your summer projects!

MISSION FOCUS: MOSAIC MIDDLE FAST (MMF)



Since MME last featured in the magazine, its work has continued resiliently both at St. George's Baghdad, under the direction of its parish priest, the Rev'd Faiz Jirjees, and also in Northern Iraq where an education

project is managed by Ghanim Ilyas, the Executive Director of Ghasin Al-Zaiton, and at Olive Tree House, Amman, Jordan, about which I have written in an earlier issue.

This month, we shall concentrate on the work of MME at the Al Ahli Hospital, Gaza City. On Palm Sunday, the hospital received a devastating airstrike. A first-hand account has been received by MME from one of its partners, a representative of the Episcopal Diocese of Jerusalem & the Middle East:



"Our dedicated staff are working diligently to restore the affected areas and ensure the uninterrupted delivery of critical medical care, they are highly capable of handling all kinds of emergencies and have successfully saved thousands of lives during times of attack."

As we all know, the situation in Gaza is critical. More than a million people are now suffering from infectious diseases, and unexploded bombs pose a continuing risk. No school is safe, and access for medical evacuations virtually impossible. The psychological toll is also devastating, particularly for the children. Families have been torn apart, whilst mental health services are stretched far beyond capacity.

Despite these enormous challenges, the dedicated staff of MME at the Al Ahli hospital continue their lifesaving work. Operating in three shifts, they ensure round-the-clock care for those in need. Two field hospitals have been established to increase access to medical services, and surgical capacity has expanded significantly. Every day, doctors and nurses work under extreme conditions with compassion and resilience.

Collaboration is the key to the response to the situation. MME is working closely with partner organisations to coordinate resources and ensure aid reaches those most in need. From medical supplies to food distribution, every effort is being made to maximise its impact despite the restrictions in place.

The road ahead is uncertain, but, says the Medical Director of the hospital, "our mission remains clear: to provide healing hope and dignity to those suffering in Gaza. We are grateful for the continued support of our global partners, whose solidarity enables us to keep going in these darkest of times".

So we are asked to continue to pray for an end to all hostilities, the release of hostages, and a lasting peace.

NEWS FROM THE ORCHARD: WILDFLOWER MEADOW IN PROGRESS



You may have noticed that we have been hard at work in the fenced off wildflower meadow area. We are very excited to report that we were recently joined by a new volunteer, Nick, who lives locally, and works in conservation, biodiversity and ecology and is a guest speaker at RHS Wisley.

Nick is particularly interested in helping us develop the wildflower meadow, having had previous experience in helping to restore wildflower meadows in the Netherlands. He has very kindly consulted with colleagues at Wisley and put together a programme of work.

The major problem to overcome was that the existing ground was too fertile to produce a viable meadow. We had too much grass, even with the yellow rattle (which is semi-parasitic to grass), that we had already planted. The expert advice - take up the grass.



Our work began in April - spring being the best time to start this kind of project. Together, with Nick directing, we removed the turf and then raked the soil in order to remove stones and obstructions. We then left the area for a couple of weeks. We continued raking and removing



stones during this period and additionally picked out any new growth of grass and unwanted weeds that had sprouted up.

At the beginning of May the first batch of wildflower seeds was sown, mixed with horticultural sand and compost to increase their success rate. The mix was then gently watered in.

Nick has very kindly curated and donated all the seeds for our new wildflower meadow. The seeds are a native mix of annuals and perennials. We have a wonderful selection that includes woodland seeds for shady areas - for example foxglove, mallow and teasel; a wildlife mix that includes knapweed, self-heal, corn marigold and poppies; seed balls of corn-



flower, corn chamomile, wild marjoram, viper's bugloss, and night-flowering catchfly and much more...



We look forward to the first shoots in anticipation! It will be tall and short flower aesthetics, and we should note that this will take time - the first year (this year) may only see a small amount of growth with the annuals - it may not be until next spring that we start to see the best results.

In the autumn the programme will include a second seeding in order to fill any gaps and to make a complete cover. We will also seed yellow rattle around the edges to discourage encroaching grasses.

We would love to have more volunteers – especially to help with watering during the dry weather so that the seeds can germinate, begin their journey and not dry out. If you can help, do please get in touch via the church office (allsaintschurchgfd@gmail.com)



BIG BUILD UPDATE



Faculty

The 30 day public notice period has passed and the faculty was sent to the Diocesan Registrar for consideration. It has been approved and lasts initially for 30 months. There were some conditions:

- 1. Planning Permission is to be obtained from Guildford Borough Council.
- 2. Completion of The Building Works Questionnaire, plus any other conditions of the church insurers.
- 3. Works are not to commence until 85% of the total funds required are obtained or pledged.

Planning

The architects have everything ready to submit our planning permission apart from an Ecologist report regarding our Biodiversity Net Gain (BNG). This is a government requirement and it is to make sure that habitats for wildlife are left in a measurably better state than they were before the development.

Essentially, after a development, we not only have to recover any lost biodiversity (e.g. through building over grass, removing hedges etc) but we have to show a 10% increase in biodiversity. Guildford Borough Council have increased this level to be a 20% gain.

There is a raft of complicated calculations which are done by an ecologist to calculate BNG. We engaged The Ecology Co-op to survey our site which they did at the end of April. We are awaiting their report, which goes with our planning application, to describe how we can achieve the required 20% BNG. The ecologist indicated that we will be able to achieve a 10% gain on-site but will likely fall short of the 20%. Much like carbon offsetting, you can purchase off-site 'units' to make up the short fall

Funding

The Finance Vision Group have done some further work on grant funding. The majority of funds require planning permission to be in place before making an application. However Marshalls, who can offer grants of up to £25,000, do not require planning permission and Beverly has submitted an application. Marshalls have advised that a surveyor will shortly visit the church.

Brochure

We are at an early stage preparing a brochure to send to everyone interviewed as part of the Community Audit and for anyone who needs more information about our project.

UNIVERSITY CHAPLAINCY

As part of our training for ordination, we are asked to spend time with an external organisation. This might be missionary led or chaplaincy led.

I chose to spend time with the University of Surrey Chaplaincy team. I started my placement in November and finished in February - all in all about 40 hours of volunteer work.

I enjoyed it so much and felt I was called to some actional discipleship and asked if I could stay on as a volunteer chaplain in the team. By God's grace I have been accepted and now work a day a week as a volunteer trainee chaplain. I just love it. I work alongside 35 people that represent just about every faith. Whilst we all have different beliefs, we all share the one common goal: to care for the 3,500 staff and 15,000 students at the University of Surrey. I am fortunate enough to work with so many faiths and I'm really enjoying learning about them all. There are many different Christian denominations too: Anglican, Orthodox, Roman Catholic, Methodist plus free churches such as Emmaus Road.

This week alone I have been handing out drinks to students as they leave the exam hall and talking to them to make sure thy are OK. I attended the start of a programme that is looking at LBGTQIA+ throughout the university and how this works out across all the different faiths. We have also resurrected the Staff and Student Community Garden. After five years of non-use (post COVID) we are bringing it back to its former glory. There are also five bee hives there too that make honey for the university!

My training starts soon that will work in conjunction with my current ordination training module on pastoral care. We're going to cover:

- Listening and presence skills
- Pastoral Theology (all faiths)

- Responding to Crisis
- Ethical Practice and boundaries

THANK GOD FOR FARMERSI

Open Farm Sunday is this year on 8th June, when Christians are being asked to remember farmers. This prayer contemplates where our food comes from, and then celebrates the work of the farmers who produce it. The Arthur Rank Centre (ARC) is a charity which supports the rural community and its churches through a programme of community and social projects, resourcing and training.

Cabbages come in polythene bags, devoid of hidden insects and other creepy crawlies. Potatoes are mud free and ready for the oven. Meat is presented in sterile packs whilst milk is pasteurised and semi skimmed in conveniently shaped containers that fit in the fridge.

The management of the Estate is undertaken by ELM Group Ltd who employ two members of staff to take care of the day to day running of the Estate.




5TH GUILDFORD SCOUT GROUP NEEDS YOU!





Would you like to know about God By Tim Dowley, SPCK, £25 (for a pack of ten)


How do you explain the importance of God to a child? This early learning book may be helpful to you. It helps children explore their spiritual understanding of who God is, in a relatable and accessible way.
