MISSION FOCUS: CHRISTIAN AID WEEK SUNDAY IITH TO SATURDAY 17TH MAY

This year, even more than usual there seems to be great need in the world, while aid budgets are being cut by many governments around the world. Sometimes we may wonder, "what can I do as one person?" But actually we can act to support those in need around the world by supporting charities that work in the most difficult circumstances in countries where there are famines, wars and natural disasters such as earthquakes, droughts and floods. One of these charities is Christian Aid. At the end of this article I will set out ways that **WE AT ALL SAINTS CAN HELP!**

Christian Aid was set up after the Second World War by churches in the UK and Ireland – hence its name. However Christian Aid does not just help Christians – it was set up (and continues to help) those of all faiths and none. For 80 years, Christian Aid has provided humanitarian relief and long term development support for poor communities worldwide, while highlighting suffering, tackling injustice and championing people's rights.

This year Christian Aid is highlighting the problems faced by farmers due to climate change. For example, in Guatemala, gruelling heatwaves and extreme weather are destroying Aurelia's farm. Aurelia (below left) worries about how much harvest her family will have to eat and sell. Aurelia and Amelia (below right) are both from the indigenous Q'eqchi' community of the Alta Verapaz region of Guatemala They are finding that a lack of water is killing their crops. Industrial plantations less than



a mile from Amelia's farm take the region's natural resources to feed the world's richest countries, while local farmers do not have enough water to grow fruit and vegetables.

Christian Aid works with some of the world's most vulnerable communities in Africa, Asia, the Middle East, Europe, Latin America and the Caribbean. As their website states:

Together with our supporters and partners, we aim:

- + to expose poverty throughout the world.
- + to help in practical ways to end it.

+ to highlight, challenge and change the structures and systems that favour the rich and powerful over the poor and marginalised.

We believe in life before death

+ We seek to follow the teaching of Jesus Christ, who commanded his followers to love their neighbour and work for a better world.

+ We stand with the most vulnerable and excluded people of the world – both in times of crisis and for the longer term. We give people survival essentials when they are without shelter or refuge, and help them find the strength and resources they need to flourish and protect themselves from shocks and disasters.

+ We support people to stand up for their rights and to build stable, secure lives they can enjoy living.

We're part of a global movement for change

+ Together, we have great influence and impact. We want people to pray with us, to act, to give and to get involved with us in a variety of ways.

+ We work to educate and mobilise people from all kinds of backgrounds to build a movement that can change the course of history and bring social justice to all.

+ We campaign to ensure a more equal division of power in the world, promoting the rights and voices of women and girls – and anyone discriminated against because of who they are.

+ We push our political leaders to tackle climate change and tax dodging – which hit the poorest the hardest – and for our society to welcome those who have been forced to flee their homes overseas.

We in **Guildford** can be part of this movement to bring help to those who are in need. **In Christian Aid week we can:**

1) **Deliver envelopes** to houses in this area. No need to collect them – we put information on the back of each envelope as to how people can give online, or where they can return their envelopes to. If you have 30 minutes to spare in Christian Aid week, please deliver some envelopes. Please sign up on the list in the church entrance to say which road(s) you would like to deliver to – envelopes can be collected from the church entrance nearer the time **to be delivered only from 11th to 17th May**.

2) Cake sale and car wash at Onslow Village Hall from **2pm to 4.30pm** on Saturday **17th May**. This is always popular – last year we had a constant stream of cars all afternoon, and sold many cakes. Please come and support this – bake cakes, buy cakes, wash cars and bring your car to be washed. Also please encourage your neighbours to come. Please let Katherine Hopwood know what help you can offer.

3) **Give to Christian Aid** – either return an envelope to All Saints, or give online with the QR code on the next page or at this link:

4) **Pray** for the work of Christian Aid.



WILD BRIGHT HOPE (REFLECTIONS ON FAITH) An Appraisal of the Lent Course 2025

Fourteen members of the congregation signed up for the 2025 All Saints' Lent Course in March. The agenda for this year was some, but not all, of the twelve chapters contained in the book entitled 'Wild Bright Hope', having the subtitle 'Reflections on Faith'. Beverly invited Rev. Julian Hubbard (known with affection to many of us) and Martyn Whiteman to lead five evenings at the Vicarage of discussion and



prayer. We were blessed by our leaders' skills in bringing out insights from all who attended, and at the same time providing informed guidance on the topics discussed. It was good to be able to meet together in person again, following years of Zoom-only meetings, for interactive dialogue, which, once we had got used to the microphone being passed round to each speaker, worked pretty well. The fact that the Vicarage living room was filled with people at the last meeting speaks volumes for the continuing interest created by this book.

The book itself is a compilation of contributions from twelve young authors, all with connections to the Church of England, whose aim is to encourage us to look with hope on the future of the church. They had been invited at the instigation of Justin Welby, the original aim being to call it 'The Archbishop's Lent Course 2025'; however, the pre-publication enforced resignation of the Archbishop caused that epithet to be dropped. Possibly, that event was in the background of our thoughts all the while during our studies and it goes without saying that it could not have increased the general mood of optimism in the church. We wondered why the book described hope as being 'wild' and 'bright'. I can't say that we were any better informed at the end of the course about this. Possibly the explanation for the adjective 'wild' was a chapter (which we did not cover) about the wild scenes in a stadium in Mozambique when the crowd erupted after peace had been declared at the end of 30 years of Frelimo warfare. And 'bright'? Possibly because each of the contributors is a lively up-and-coming writer, who writes passionately about what gives them hope for the future.

'Hope' was well defined by each author, I thought. Christian hope, as the sub-title to the book makes clear, is based on faith, and so is more than mere optimism. But, equally, numerous grounds for optimism will lead to our feelings of hope being increased. We were encouraged by the spiritual declarations made by pop stars and others to their audiences. We were encouraged by an increased awareness of the murky past of colonialism, involving slavery and 'enforced conversions'. We are certainly better informed on reading that 70% of Christians in the world are from global majority heritage backgrounds, with Africa having more than 650 million Christians.

But we were perhaps less encouraged by a tendency exhibited by some of the writers to continue to hold the church responsible for past 'taking' of cultural heritages, despite attempts by fair minded theologians to present a more balanced judgement on past history. On the other hand, one writer, a Zimbabwean priest now in charge of several rural Kent villages, said that when she arrived in England, she expected to find the church to be a dying institution. Despite falling church attendances, she had positively found that this was not the case. However, she also maintained that the Church of England was at a crossroads. Whilst important strides had been made in addressing issues relating to gender, race, sexuality and safeguarding (witness the increasing numbers of women bishops and greater diversity), there were still reports of exclusion, racism and safeguarding failures which suggest that the journey towards inclusion was far from complete.

We were also invited, having just studied the ideas in that chapter, to set out what we thought were the qualities needed to be found in the next Archbishop of Canterbury, which would be sent in to the central committee of the Church of England as a response to a sounding out of the parishes throughout the country. Martyn was able to send in our considered judgement, namely "a person who would be a peacemaker, diplomat. listener, forward thinker, inclusive, broadminded, and with humility acknowledging past shortcomings in the church."

One can only be selective in writing this appraisal, as were Julian and Martyn in selecting which chapters we were to read. At the end of the course, someone recommended that we read the final chapter of the book called Hope in Suffering. It faced the question which Justin Welby himself has publicly admitted that he did not know the answer to, namely "How do we reconcile the experience of human suffering with the existence of a loving God?" This chapter, for me, was the most helpful of all the chapters, as it deepened one's understanding of the true nature of the divine, expressed by the life of Jesus. Perhaps St. Paul was right when he famously wrote about Christianity: "There are three basic concepts, namely faith, hope and love, but the greatest of them is love".

HEDGEHOG HIGHWAYS INITIATIVE LAUNCH

A joint collaboration between All Saints' Church, Onslow Village Residents' Association and Dr Tara Pirie of the University of Surrey

Sunday 6th April saw the launch of our Hedgehog Highways collaboration between All Saints' Eco Group, Onslow Village Residents' Association (OVRA) and Dr Tara Pirie of the University of Surrey.

What's it about..?

The aim of the initiative is to encourage our local community to help hedgehogs by creating hedgehog friendly habitats within our surrounding neighbourhood and parish.



The launch event...

Dr Pirie, who is a lecturer in ecology and conservation, and Chair of the University's Hedgehog Working Group, gave a talk in the church hall on how we can help save hedgehogs. The event was well attended and was followed afterwards by a demonstration in the orchard of how to set up a mammal tracking tunnel for monitoring hedgehog activity (see left). Dr Pirie began her talk by discussing the current very poor status of hedgehogs, which is not good. Since 2000 there has been a 75% reduction in rural hedgehog populations and in 2020 hedgehogs were added to the red list of threatened species. They are now considered vulnerable to extinction in Britain.

She spoke of the threats to hedgehogs – partic-

ularly in rural areas with habitat loss from development, fewer hedgerows (a habitat where hedgehogs would typically forage and nest), the use of pesticides, heavy machinery and busy roads. These threats continue into our suburban garden environments with the use of garden pesticides, strimmers, bonfires, and impermeable barriers that constrain foraging ranges, e.g. fences without gaps.

How can we help..?

Dr Pirie explained how we can make our garden habitats more wildlife

and hedgehog friendly with small improvements: the addition of a drinking station (a shallow dish of water); creating log piles and leaf piles (a great place to shelter); and adding hedgehog houses.

What do hedgehogs eat..?

A hedgehog's diet includes slugs, earthworms, beetles, millipedes and caterpillars so creating a wild space where they can forage is a great



way to ensure they can feed. In addition, planting wild flowers and incorporating bug houses and log piles will encourage more insects and beetles into your garden. A key fact: Hedgehogs are lactose intolerant, so don't put out milk, just water. And if you'd like to supplement their food on the colder autumn days before they go into hibernation, go for a meat-based wet dog or cat food (in a shallow dish) - never bread, as this has no nutritional value and just fills their stomachs up.

Hedgehog Highways...

Most importantly, we learnt how we can help hedgehogs move between areas. Hedgehogs like to roam, and on average can cover a distance of 2km on a single night. So for urban hedgehogs, we need to create 'hedgehog highways' by linking up our gardens. We can do this by ensuring we have hedgehog sized holes (13x13cm) in our garden boundaries e.g. by cutting a hole in fences that lack a natural hole in or under



them. You could also consider ramps in a tiered garden and where levels are raised between one garden and the next, as hedgehogs (with short legs) aren't great at climbing.

Monitoring hedgehog activity...

Dr Pirie and her students have been monitoring hedgehog activity on the Surrey University campus via the use of mammal tracking tunnels. There is good news – hedgehog numbers appear to have increased since the university began looking for their tracks in 2020. Additionally, the university is part of a nationwide Hedgehog



Friendly Campus programme (with gold status), helping to make safer hedgehogfriendly environments. Dr Pirie finished her talk on the orchard where she demonstrated suitable places to position a tracking tunnel – somewhere flat, so you can peg it down, and ideally next to a fence or hedge as these are boundaries where hedgehogs are most likely to be travelling or nesting (hedge hogging). The photo on the previous page shows a good example of tunnel positioning in our orchard woodland trail.

If you would like to monitor hedgehog activity in your garden, All Saints and OVRA have purchased a set of ten tracking tunnels. These tunnels can now be borrowed for a two-week period by contacting OVRA— <u>info@ovra.org.uk</u>. The tunnels should be left outside for one week and checked daily for mammal activity (mammals entering the tunnel will leave footprints). The tunnel will come with a packet of hedgehog food, a pot of animal-friendly ink, instructions, and a common mammal footprint identification card.

How to report a hedgehog sighting...

You can report sightings to the British Hedgehog Preservation Society's BIG Hedgehog Map by going online to Hedgehog Street -

<u>www.hedgehogstreet.org</u> - and clicking on the link to 'Home of the BIG Hedgehog Map' or go directly to <u>bighedgehogmap.org</u>.

Additionally, Dr Pirie has a survey taking place at the university and would be delighted to include our area. There is a QR code available on the OVRA website - <u>ovra.org.uk</u> - and click on the Hedgehog Highways Project link. Since the talk we have already had confirmed hedgehog footprints (right) and a sighting (top left)! A recording of the talk will also be available shortly on All Saints' and OVRA's websites.

CHURCH WALK - BANK HOLIDAY MONDAY. 5TH MAY

The Missions Vision Group is organising the church walk on 5th May – a shorter walk than last year. This year we will meet at All Saints from 10.15am, in time to depart All Saints at 10.30am for a direct route to Watts Gallery over the Hog's Back (compared to last year's route which went via the river and St Catherine's). We are hoping that some international students will join us for this walk.

For those meeting us at Watts Gallery, we will leave at 12 noon (meeting outside the main entrance to the café). This will allow folk time to go to the lavatory, or have a quick cup of tea. We will walk to St John's, Puttenham along the Pilgrims' Way/North Downs Way where there will be time to eat a picnic lunch that you have brought with you. We will return by the same route – so some people may choose to just join us for the middle part of the walk from Watts Gallery to Puttenham and back, which is suitable for pushchairs. Please note that Watts Gallery now charges £1 per vehicle for non members to park there.

Please sign up on the sheet at church, with all names of those who would like to join the walk, and whether you will meet at church or at the gallery. The pace of the walk will be gentle, to allow the younger members of our congregation (with shorter legs) to join us. All younger members need a responsible adult with them. If, on the day, anyone decides not to do all of the walk/the part they have signed up for, it is important that they let Katherine or Bruce Hopwood know this. There will be one car parked at Puttenham if anyone needs a lift back to collect their car from Watts Gallery. Please let us know in advance if you need this.

The walk will still take place if it rains, but please note that the path to Watts Gallery over the Hog's Back gets very muddy during and after rain, so please wear appropriate footwear! The path from Watts Gallery to Puttenham is in better condition.

The hospital is run by the Episcopal Church in Jerusalem and the Middle East.

This stamp appeal is being run by the Church of Scotland.




BIG BUILD UPDATE



• We have displayed the Public Notice and Certificate of Publication for 30 days inside and outside the church and returned it to the diocesan registrar. This allows us to move forward with obtaining full planning permission.

- Our architect is in the process of completing the various forms needed for a full planning application to Guildford Borough Council. There is just one missing document, a 'Biodiversity Net Gain' calculation. An ecologist is visiting at the end of April and will provide us with a report mid-May. Among other biodiversity-related issues, she will be considering the preservation of bats.
- The steering group has agreed to delay the meeting with the wider community about our plans until soon after the summer break. In the meantime we are putting together a brochure promoting the project, which will be available in July.
- Work has been carried out by the Finance Vision Group searching for suitable schemes offering grants to churches. Many have been investigated and two have been found which do not need to be accompanied with planning permission approval. Applications have been made and we should have some further information in June.

DIOCESE OF GUILDFORD CHURCHES BLAZE THE ECO TRAIL THIS EARTH DAY

The Diocese of Guildford currently has the highest number of Gold Eco Churches in the UK. The prestigious credential awarded by the Christian environmental charity, A Rocha UK, has been bestowed on five of the diocese's churches. It is an award scheme designed to motivate and resource churches to care for God's earth in their everyday work and witness. In total, 66% of churches in the Diocese of Guildford have signed up to the Eco Church scheme, with 105 churches receiving some kind of award.

Just ahead of Earth Day, a number of the diocese's Gold Eco Churches were celebrated at a special event hosted at All Saints' Church, Guildford. The event was an opportunity for churches to share inspiration of how they got their award, how they are putting creation care at the heart of their ministry, and engaging their congregation and wider community in caring for the environment.

Attending the event were representatives including clergy and eco teams from All Saints Guildford, St Nicolas Great Bookham, Holy Trinity Guildford and All Saints Ockham. All gave presentations sharing their work in front of each other and to both Bishop Paul and Bishop Andrew.

The celebration largely took place in All Saints' orchard, which has restored and developed natural habitats for local plants and wildlife. The orchard comprises approximately 150 hedge saplings and ten fruit trees. Speaking at the event, both Bishop Paul and Bishop Andrew noted that they were always reminded of the urgency of the climate crisis and its impact when speaking with other Bishops in the Global South. Bishop Paul commended the work of the Eco Churches and invited them to a future event where they can support some of the Silver Eco Churches as they progress in their environmental journey.

The Gold Eco Churches, which represented parishes in urban, suburban, village and rural areas, spoke about their various actions to reduce waste, encourage biodiversity, switch to green electricity, as well as not serving meat at church events.

Pope Francis 17 December 1936 - 21 April 2025



Bishop Andrew has shared the following message following the death of Pope Francis at aged 88:

"Pope Francis was an inspiration to hundreds of millions both within and beyond the Roman Catholic church, and we give thanks for his warm compassion, simplicity of life, commitment to God's Creation and deep joy in the gospel of Jesus Christ, which he commended so consistently and winsomely.

"It seems appropriate that he has been welcomed home in this resurrection

season, so shortly after blessing the Easter pilgrims in Rome; and while we rejoice in a life well lived, we pray for all who mourn his passing."

The last time there was no Pope and no Archbishop of Canterbury simultaneously was for a brief period in May 1691.

The See of Canterbury was vacant from 1st February 1690 to 31st May 1691, after the then-Archbishop was deprived of his office. Pope Alexander VIII died in February 1691.

Therefore, for a few months in early 1691, both positions were vacant.

It's interesting to note that the current situation, with Pope Francis's recent passing and the Archbishop of Canterbury's resignation earlier this year, marks the first time this has happened in over 300 years, since that brief period in 1691.



A prayer, giving thanks for the Pope's life of ministry:

Father in heaven, we praise your name for all who have finished this life loving and trusting you, for the example of their lives, the life and grace you gave them and the peace in which they rest. We praise you today for your servant Francis and for all that you did through him. Meet us in our sadness and fill our hearts with praise and thanksgiving, for the sake of our risen Lord, Jesus Christ.

Into your hands, O merciful Saviour, we commend your servant Francis. Acknowledge, we pray, a sheep of your own fold, a lamb of your own flock, a sinner of your own redeeming. Enfold him in the arms of your mercy, in the blessed rest of everlasting peace and in the glorious company of the saints in light.










Fantastically Faithful World Changers Who Gave Their All For God By Paul Kerensa, SPCK, £7.99

By Various Authors, BRF, £14.99


