Our pattern of services is as follows:

- ★ Morning Prayer takes place Monday to Wednesday at 9.15am in the church and via Zoom for anyone who would like this option.
- ★ A service of Holy Communion is held in church every Thursday morning at 9.30am.
- ★ An 8am service of Holy Communion is held in church on the first and third Sundays of the month (the third Sunday will use the Book of Common Prayer).
- ★ Our 10am Sunday services follow this pattern:
 - ◊ First Sunday: Café-style Altogether Worship
 - Second, fourth and fifth Sundays:
 Family Communion with Children's Church
 - \diamond $\;$ Third Sunday: Morning Worship with Children's Church

THOUGHTS FROM THE VICARAGE



If October was a month for giving thanks – with Harvest festivals and the beginning of autumn, then November may be characterised as a month for remembering. It begins with bonfire Night, and those words so many of associate with it: 'Remember, remember the 5th of November, gunpower, treason and plot. For there is a reason why gunpowder and treason should

ne'er be forgot'. The 5th November is also the day we celebrate our Patronal Festival of All Saints, where we remember the saints of old – all those who have gone before us in the faith, and have now entered the Lord's rest. The Sunday afterwards, 12th November, we come to Remembrance Sunday itself; and, as in previous years, we'll be joined by our local uniformed groups in the morning, followed by a Service for the Bereaved in the afternoon. It's a season for remembering.

Yet, as we consider events in the world around us, and particularly the crisis emerging in the Middle East between Israel and Hamas, it becomes clear that simply remembering what happened in the past isn't good enough. If we dwell on the injustices of the past, and allow bitterness and resentment to build, we find ourselves trapped by what has gone before. That's just as true in our personal lives as it is on the world stage.

The message of the Gospel is one of truth-speaking, of honesty, of careful listening, of mercy, of forgiveness, of reconciliation, of healing, and of hope. Jesus modelled this in all his dealings with people: speaking the uncomfortable truth to self-satisfied Pharisees; challenging the rich young ruler about his priorities in life; listening carefully to Jairus as his daughter lay dying; offering forgiveness to the woman caught in adultery; bringing together tax collectors, sinners, and prostitutes into his inner circle; healing the woman with the haemorrhage; speaking hope to the thief dying by his side on the cross. In his life, and through his death, Jesus spoke of grace, mercy, and forgiveness.

During this month of November, this season of remembering, let's hold on to all that is good, all that is lovely, all that is true. Let's also recognise when we need to come to terms with the past, so that we can move into a better future – the future the Lord offers to all who put their faith and trust in him.

MISSION FOCUS: MOSAIC MIDDLE EAST (MME)




I have recently received from MME an informative, yet stark, video of a conversation between Rev'd Canon Faiz Jirjees, the Anglican Vicar of St. George's Church in Baghdad and a partner with MME in its work in the Middle East, and the former Archbishop of Canterbury, Rowan Williams, who is himself Patron of MME and a passionate advocate of its aims and objectives. Canon Faiz starts the video by answering the crucial question: "What is the future of Christians in Iraq?".

He responds by saying that they need us here in the UK to help them and to stand with them in solidarity, so that they are not left to flounder in the reality of the situation that they live in. Christians in Iraq need spiritual, moral and financial support, so that their confidence and sense of stability inside Iraq may be restored. (Canon Faiz does not mention persecution as such, but he concentrates more on the aspect of not letting the existing Christian community be demoralised, I think.)

Rowan Williams then asked Canon Faiz to tell how the work of his church in

Baghdad might be expanded. As readers may remember from past articles here on the work of MME, St. George's not only attends to the spiritual needs of the remaining Christians in that beleaguered city, but also runs a medical clinic for people of all faiths and none, with the help of volunteers and financial assistance from churches such as All Saints. This is vital medical work which benefits the whole community of Baghdad. Canon Faiz reminds us that our religious beliefs (i.e. our faith) must always be accompanied by humanitarian work, and that these two strands of Christianity are inseparable. As Christians, we are taught and come to believe that if a person comes to you hungry, it is not enough to say that God will provide. We are expected to show our love as Good Samaritans by feeding this person with enough food to satisfy him.

exclusively Muslim, and, for that matter, that not all Muslims are Arabs. He also mentioned that the attention of Governments seemed to be a transient thing, moving rapidly on to the next disaster relief need, and abandoning an earlier one which still needed support. So we in the UK need to work harder to remind our politicians that support is still needed for minority communities in places like Iraq, and to continue to

give our own financial and spiritual support, as we are doing at All Saints, to organisations such as MME.

In previous articles we have highlighted a particular aspect of the work of MME. This time let us put the spotlight on the Nineveh SEED programme. This happens in Northern Iraq (readers will recall that the prophet Ionah was called by God to minister to the people of Nineveh!). MME carefully identifies, plans and executes sustainable projects that help people to regain their livelihoods. Through Nineveh SEED, MME creates jobs, provides com-

munity benefit and ultimately encourages displaced persons to return. SEED stands for Sustainable Enterprise, Economic Development. There are 23 projects in development for 2024.

We are asked to pray for MME to identify families who will benefit most from projects, and to continue to maintain a good working relationship with local community leaders. Please also pray for security in the region to improve, and for the safety of the MME Programme Manager, Abdulrahman. And, finally, we should pray that substantial funding should continue to come in to MME from individuals, churches and other sources to enable the Nineveh SEED programme to reach out even further.

Having received a drawing with the combination of all the best bits from the three original concept drawings, there still a couple of queries to be resolved. One is the location of the iconic bell tower and the other is the size of access into the storage area from the church.

An additional requirement has been identified – a defied footpath around the new extension allowing safe access from the church to the hall for pushchairs etc .

The next stage will be some detailed elevation drawings which will be based on the results of the various surveys now being undertaken. We hope to have them available before Christmas.



What are your desert island discs, and why?



STIR UP SUNDAY

Stir up Sunday this year is on November 26th. The collect for this date is from the Book of Common Prayer 1549, and begins 'Stir up, we beseech thee, O Lord, the wills of thy people'. This prayer settled the date of the last Sunday before Advent to make the Christmas pudding.

By the 1300s, a rudimentary pudding known as frumenty was eaten. It was a soupy mix of beef, mutton, spices, wine and dried prunes. As trade expanded over the course of the next two hundred years, dried fruit and new spices were added.

However, after the Civil War, we had a republican government from 1649 to 1653. It was made up of Puritans and, as the Christmas festivities, including pudding, were too much fun, they were banned.

In 1714, George I from Hanover became king. He really enjoyed puddings and was known as the Pudding King. He introduced a plum pudding.

His grandson, George III became king in 1760, his wife was Queen Charlotte and she was also German, from Mecklenburg-Strelitz. Christmas was then held in the newly purchased Buckingham House known at the time as the Queen's House. She brought a different recipe for pudding.

However, for the pudding we know today we must look to Charles Dickens and his description of Mrs Cratchit bringing the pudding to the table with flames and a sprig of holly. For years the family came to the kitchen to stir the bowl and make a wish. The pudding should contain 13 ingredients to remind us of Jesus and the 12 disciples. It should be stirred from east to west to acknowledge the journey of the magi.



BOOK REVIEWS

Stick with Love - Rejoicing in Every Tongue, Every Tribe, Every Nation The Archbishop of York's Advent Book 2023 By Arun Arora, SPCK, £10.99

Martin Luther King famously declared that 'I have decided to stick with love... Hate is too great a burden to bear'. In these luminous daily readings, Arun Arora helps us consider the biblical picture of the Church as the people of God, drawn from every tribe, every tongue, and every nation.



Themes of racial justice, hospitality and welcome are explored alongside the stories of saints from across the globe. Beginning with reflections from Isaiah and Revelation, the meditations lead us on to consider the missionaries, martyrs and mystics who light our Advent way.



The Manual - getting masculinity right By Al Steward, 10Publishing, £11.04

Understanding what it means to be male has never been more confusing. As more male behaviour is called out for being patriarchal or toxic, how does a man navigate these waters? What does healthy masculinity even look like, and what examples are there of good men that can be followed?

This book explores many of the issues that men struggle with: what it means to be a healthy son,

workmate, friend, single man, husband and father. It works through much of the current debate on masculinity and finds helpful advice from many experts. But most importantly, it works through what the Bible has to say about men, and how being a follower of Jesus is central to living a life that loves and serves others.

With your people across the globe at this time of international crisis, we cry out, 'Where are you, Lord?'

'My children,
I hear your cries, and know this:
I am in the heart of this darkness.
I hear the cry of the innocent;
I feel the pain of the fearful;
