THOUGHTS FROM THE VICARAGE



Over the past few months I've been thinking quite a lot about the people who have gone before us at All Saints; and particularly those who were instrumental in giving us the buildings we have today. It's an inspiring story.

Back in 1922 the rector of St. Nicolas' Church in Guildford paid £20 for a hut on the corner of Wilderness Road and Orchard Road – which became the first church building in Onslow Village. A few

years later, in 1927, a larger building was purchased on the site we now use. The cost was £1000, and it was paid by the Revd John Skinner. By the late 1950s fund raising began for a new church – the building we now fondly refer to as 'All Saints' today.

The project was taken up in earnest by the then vicar of All Saints, the Revd Tom New. The congregation was faced with the task of raising £30,000, which was a considerable challenge at the time. But the goal was achieved, and our current building was consecrated on the 9th December 1967. Some of our present members at All Saints remember that time clearly – Jean and Tony Reed, Margaret Arni, Sheila Kirkland and others. They were among those whose faith and commitment realised their dream of a modern building in the heart of our parish.

Today we have reached the stage of fundraising for the Big Build project, and we will be launching our fundraising appeal on the 24th November, with a Gift Day. We hope to raise £300,000 of the £750,000 needed to substantially extend and improve our buildings. When completed, we will be able to offer an extended worship space, a 'hospitality area' in the current foyer, a catering size kitchen, three toilets and an enlarged office. It's a vision that has been developing over the past couple of years, and one that we long to become a reality in the next year or so.

So what is it for? Why are we embarking on this costly and demanding project? Well the reason is that we're following in the footsteps of those who have gone before us. Like them, we seek to provide a welcoming and hospitable space, which is fit for purpose in our generation. Like them, we want All Saints to be a community hub at the centre of our parish, welcoming everyone, serving the needs of people around us, and

standing as a beacon of light and hope for everyone – the light and hope that are to be found in Jesus our Lord.

So in this month of November I'd encourage each one of us to get on board with this vision; to pray daily that it will come to fruition; to ask the Lord how we can be part of this project ourselves; to consider how we might give financially to see this vision become a reality. Let's be inspired by those who have served faithfully in the past, and pray that we'll step up to the plate in our generation.

MISSION FOCUS: NORTH GUILDFORD FOOD BANK



The North Guildford Food Bank at St Clare's, Park Barn has been set up to provide temporary help for individuals and families in the Guildford area who are in need. Working alongside local agencies and churches, it wants to ensure that no-one goes hungry.

The food bank receives non-perishable food from local churches, supermarkets, schools and businesses to make up food parcels. Various agencies such as the Citizens Advice Bureau, social services, the council etc then refer people who are experiencing short term financial difficulties.

Each Harvest time, the food bank sends out a list of items that they

would especially appreciate for their clients. We then post it on our weekly newssheet to guide us as to what is most needed, and it enables them to provide for their clients in the best possible way. We were so grateful for all the items that were brought to church, and the food bank were very thankful for the many bags and boxes of tins, jars, packets of food, etc that we delivered to them at St Clare's, Park Barn.

In 2023, it provided 1,709 food parcels, feeding 2,669 adults and 2072 children. The main reasons for needing help were unemployment and debt. The main referrers were Guildford Borough Council, Home School Link Workers and Citizens Advice.



In the two weeks before Christmas last year there was a huge increase in demand, serving 306 clients, compared to 200 in December 2022. It had some reserves in the bank so that they could buy more stock, in addition to food donations, which was needed on an almost daily basis. Monthly spend on food more than doubled in December and the usually healthy stock

levels were reduced to nothing for many foods. The food bank also provided Tesco vouchers in December, in addition to the food parcels, giving clients the opportunity to buy extra items for their families over Christmas.

As we begin to consider our own Christmas shopping and plan meals, it would be good to remember the extra demands which the food bank will experience. It is already beginning to start collecting a few extras for Christmas so if anyone is able to donate gift toiletries for men, women and children, they would love to receive them! Financial donations are also much needed and can be given by bank transfer or cheque.

THE STORY OF LONDON'S CITY CHURCHES

For hundreds of years the City of London was surrounded by walls and was home to thousands of people. They worked, had families and worshipped. Each small neighbourhood had a church, and within an area of one square mile there were a hundred churches.

The Great Fire in 1660 burnt 86 of these churches. Not all were rebuilt, but eventually 51 were replaced.

Times changed and people began moving into the new suburbs. By 1860 parliament passed the Union of Benefices. This reduced the number of parishes, and the surplus churches were demolished.

During the Blitz 18 churches were destroyed. Following the war the city was almost empty of people. In 1994 the Bishop of London published a report recommending the closure and reuse of a number of churches. These proposals reactivated a charity called The Friends of the City Churches who then organised watchers so that churches could open and receive visitors. The friends organised Zoom calls for their events, services and talks.

A communion is celebrated in a different church each working day for city workers. It's good to know these old churches are being looked after.

FINANCE IS FUN

Our finance team is about to meet to start setting the budget for next year. I know we've only just had the autumn fair and are still waiting for fireworks, but the work of the finance team is never done!

We will be asking leaders in the church how much they think they will need in 2025 to keep our church running and, very importantly, growing, for our community.

We provide the budget holders with this year's actual spend and a proposed budget for next year to help guide them. To this they add in additional expenses they think they might need.

We then add this all up and make sure it meets the income we expect to have. Now, if it doesn't add up, then we all have a little chat ... and then it does!! Collaborative teams in action, I think they call it.

The income comes from generous donations from all of you, the hire of the hall and church, the rent from the property we owe, and wonderful Gift Aid. We also obtain significant income from our events. For example, the autumn fair produced a profit for our community work of £1,500 for the operational management amongst you, that's £500 per hour.

Next month I will be able to tell you about some of the important things we have used the church income for in 2024, so you can see how it is spent and the causes it goes to.



ALL AT SEA

Have you ever been left high-and-dry, felt pooped when you were under-the-weather or bearing-up as you recovered; become a dab-hand at learning-the-ropes, enjoyed an unexpected windfall to tide-you-over, or been asked to pipe-down or change-tack? You have! Then you're closer to our living nautical heritage than you might have realised. For such expressions, and many more, are still common parlance onboard sailing ships at sea. Something I rediscovered this August, when I shipped aboard the three masted gaff schooner BLUE CLIPPER, as guest crew to sail from Falmouth to La Coruña in Spain.





Once my kit was stowed, I was assigned to Blue Watch for four hours on, six-eight off, day and night, as we tacked across an uncharacteristically benign Bay of Biscay. Ocean passage-making out of sight of land is all about predicting, then chasing the varying wind patterns, working together as a team to change sail, make and mend, steer, navigate and keep a lookout across a seascape that is mostly bereft of life. We did spot the occasional breeching fin

whale, and one pitch-black midnight I was called to the foredeck to wit-

ness a school of short-beaked common dolphins effortlessly keeping pace around us as they fed on a shoal of sardines – a magical moment!

But mostly, life on board a traditional sailing ship is simply about tuning in to the rhythm of the restless sea. An unvoiced spirituality that Longfellow captured so well:



"My soul is full of longing for the secret of the sea, and the heart of the great ocean sends a thrilling pulse through me." Longings and thrills aside, grabbing some shut-eye (when you can) and eating (if you can) are high priorities. If the weather is kind, there's time off-watch to lean on the rail and reflect on life much as Byron did on his many sea voyages:

O'er the glad waters of the dark blue sea, Our thoughts as boundless, and our souls as free, Far as the breeze can bear, the billows foam, Survey our empire, and behold our home!



And truly an empire it is on which our floating home often seems a diminutive speck as the restless waves roll in from the Atlantic. Otherwise, it's about learning to heave, belay or make fast in unison to the stentorious commands of our watch leader. Ahh the unique entity that is a modernday watch leader, on a traditional sailing vessel! As with the first mate and skipper, they convey an air of dedication to a timeless tradition born of Britian's proud sailing heritage. But it goes further than that. I was left with a sense that these highly skilled sailors are only truly contented out

at sea plying their trade, well away from the tribulations, puzzling confusions and ill disciplines of shore-bound life.

All too soon the leading lights of La Coruna pierced the night sky and we anchored at dawn for the last time. With some 600 nautical miles under our belt there was a mutual sense of disappointment tinged with loss as we rode the final dingy to shore, casting wistful, silent glances astern at BLUE CLIPPER as she snubbed gracefully at her anchor, tantalising us with the promise of fresh adventures, should we ever return.

MEN'S WELLBEING GROUP



All Saints is a growing pastoral church with a multigenerational congregation and changing demographic within the community of the parish.

The Men's Wellbeing Group is here to meet the needs of both this congregation and the community, building upon the Men's Coffee Morning run by Richard Pointer. The group is open to any man over 18 years.

Men's Wellbeing We have started as a small informal group to talk about the interests and needs of those who attend and gradually build upon the structure.

Those leading this group initially are Andy Wells, Christian Bravery and Paul Fenner and we are seeking others to help grow the team!

As we discuss further we might - or indeed hope to - see mini groups form, which would be marvellous. Here are some ideas that we have received from some of the men we have spoken to. Think of it as how this might evolve over the next 12 months so this may be what it looks like this time next year!

Age Centred Mini Groups

- ♦ 18 to 29 years : mainly single, career starters, graduates, apprentices
- ♦ 30 to 50 years: fatherhood, remaining single, career centred, carer
- ♦ 51 to 65 years: retirement thinkers, empty nesters, life rethinkers
- ♦ 66+ years: retired, volunteers, grand parents

Issue Centred

- Career based: decisions on career, appraisals, job interviews, underperformance, career change
- Health based: mental well being, physical health, growing older
- Parent based: young people / children, social media challenges, adolescent children, balancing career and home life, stay at home parenting, further education
- Retirement based: pensions, time on your hands, hobbies and interests, volunteering

Men's Issues

Whilst we were researching for the group, we asked about things that

were important to men these days. Here is what they said:

Physical and Mental Health

A safe space for men to talk about their physical and mental health which would normally be a closed subject. This might include testicular and prostate cancer awareness, work and home anxiety pressures, the need to perform financially at work and the desire to be at home to create a better work/life balance.

Work Related Issues

This enables a sharing of own experiences at work. Perhaps those with experience in this field will be able to help those who need it and it could become a self-help group. This might range from interview techniques to job applications for those seeking new roles. Leadership skills are complex and there is a wide range of this knowledge within our community. Leadership is often a lonely place, and the group can offer relief from this. This might even include a person who is under underperformance or indeed redundancy stress whilst still having the need to provide for the home.

Younger Generation Issues

Concerns facing the younger generation are very different to those 20 to 30 years ago. These include acknowledging you are a Christian to your peers, climate change, their own sexuality and gender, food poverty, mental health, homelessness and money. The older generation of the group will be able to learn from these concerns and also provide help.

Relationship Issues

This might include partner issues, young people issues, the role of the man in the provision for the home and family and in modern equality times being the second provider in the home behind the partner.

It may include the influence of social media on young people, the values important to youth today, gender and sexuality influences on them.

New Found Faith

This will help men grow in faith and walk with them on this journey. Learning to share decisions men have to take with God is a large step for some men that the group can help with. Equally a man's struggle with faith is also an area the group will be able to help with.

The church is able to offer many resources and the group can assist in making these available to those who seek it and other groups they might

wish to join. It may also include taking faith further in occasional preaching, lay leadership and ordination.

The group may also establish a Bible Study Group for men if there is a need for this.

Society for a Christian Man

The increasing secular world may be challenging the life a Christian man wishes to lead. The group can assist in helping the person find time for God in a busy work and home life. There are a number of resources that can help which the group can help the person identify.










Wounded I Sing - From Advent to Christmas with George Herbert By Richard Harries, SPCK £10.99
